AVRIL MITCHELL It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Avril Mitchell. In 2009 Avril was diagnosed with mesothelioma, a cancer brought on as a result of exposure to asbestos when she worked at a company for three years in the 1960's; mesothelioma can have a dormancy of more than 40 years.

Having undergone surgery in 2009, Avril then continued to be as well as can be expected, whilst under the supervision of Maidstone Hospital, and in October 2012 she underwent a course of chemotherapy and radiotherapy. However, during the latter part of 2013, treatment was stopped when she became too weak to undertake any more and palliative care began. Avril fought the battle against the cancer so courageously and her determination of spirit is a lesson to us all. Avril spent the last 20 days of her life in the fantastic facility that is the Heart of Kent Hospice. She passed away on January 11th and whilst her family have had much time to "prepare", her passing has left a huge "Avril-shaped" hole.

Avril and Peter moved to Wateringbury from Yorkshire in 1992. Avril was a keen and active member of Paddock Wood Athletic Club during which time she completed 24 marathons in the UK and abroad. She made many friends whilst competing and training, and she inspired others to take up running; her enthusiasm and Yorkshire humour was infectious. Her family played a key part in Avril's life, especially with the arrival of her two granddaughters, Grace and Olivia. She was loved by all who knew her and will be greatly missed.

Avril's funeral took place at St John the Baptist Church in Wateringbury on January 28th with a cremation at Vinters Park Crematorium. NETTLESTEAD AND WATERINGBURY PRE-SCHOOL

MANAGERS' REPORT JANUARY 2014

After getting off to a shaky start numbers wise we are now inundated with requests for places across all sections of the provision. We have decided to cap the numbers at 18 per session for preschool which gives us leeway to offer extra one off sessions to current families.

We have also completely revamped our staffing rotas and in order to ensure staff spend as much quality time as possible with the children we have decided to employ a general assistant who can do all the odd jobs currently covered by trained staff. This has also enabled us to build in time for our Senco/staff to do specific and general observations on all children.

We have reintroduced notice boards into the playroom to be used as visual reminders to staff when a particular child needs to be observed or given a little bit of extra attention.

In the past training has been given free of charge by KCC however they are now proposing we buy training days at £300 per 6 hours for a max of 25 attendees, the venue is then paid for separately. If we book sessions in advance there is a slight discount, but we cannot carry over training from one year to the next. However, we have made the decision to deliver training ourselves and to buddy up with St Peters and St Pauls in Ditton to share expertise. If we felt there was a need for more specialised training we have contacts that we can use.

WATERINGBURY WEATHER WATCH 2013 SUMMARY You will have noticed that in 2013 we experienced unusual extremes of weather with high winds and heavy rain over the latter part of the year. This was brought about by variations in the Jet Stream (upper atmosphere wind flowing ideally from West to East). In December the cause was exceptionally cold air from the Arctic which drifted down through Canada to the United States where it met warmer air causing the Jet stream to accelerate. When the cold air reached the States it caused havoc as they experienced record low temperatures, but fortunately it did not spread across the Atlantic.

The 2013 overall rainfall figure might surprise you in that it was slightly less than average 674mm (26") against 688mm (27") with the temperatures about average. However the month by month figures show a different picture. The first 7 months of the year yielded only 251mm (9.9") of rain while the last 5 just over 423mm (16.6"). October was the wettest month of the year, although the heavy rain around the Christmas period caused the rivers to flood Wateringbury, Yalding, Maidstone and many other parts of Kent with storms battering the coast. June was the driest month, but the only unusual temperatures came in December when the average maximum was 10.34oC (50.61oF) against a norm of 7.35oC (45.24oF).

Several people have said to me that they have heard that we are in for snow; we do usually have some snow but there is nothing in the charts to suggest it is coming just yet, although by the time you read this things might have changed. WWW

DECEMBER PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk Redhill Cottage, Redhill or e-mail susan_jc@btinternet.com Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which is held directly after the monthly parish council meeting in the village hall on the first Tuesday of each month..

Due to Cllr Michael Cayzer being unwell Cllr Richard Tripp took the Chair. Mr Doug Chivers had resigned from the Council due to business and family commitments. On behalf of the Council the Chairman thanked Mr Chivers for all his help and support during his time on the Parish Council. There are now two vacancies on the Parish Council

Changes To Footpath M502 A letter received from KCC about the proposed changes to the footpath was discussed. Councillors concluded that although it was disappointing that Council's recommendations would not be considered without a lengthy and costly procedure, it was agreed to withdraw the objections. Later at the public discussion Mr Syd Thompsett said there had been great improvement to the original plan by Kent County Council but taking into account a possible public enquiry he agreed it was right that any objections should now be withdrawn. It was stated in future whenever the subject of Public Rights of Way in the village come up the Ramblers Association should be consulted at an early stage.

Wateringbury Sports & Recreational Association - Mr Mike Witts said that 27 stall holders had been approached about attending a fete on 1 June 2014. To date only 8 replies had been received and it would depend on how many agreed to come if a fete was to go ahead. Mr Witts thanked the

Council and the Clerk for their help and support received during the past year.

Drayhorse Meadow Overflow Car Park It was confirmed that planning permission had been granted for the overflow car park at Drayhorse Meadow and work would start at the appropriate time.

Speedwatch- Mr Charles Stroud said Speedwatch had been active during November with 174 detections. 29 Warning letters sent out: 13 for 2nd detection, 6 for 3rd detection, 2 for 4th detection, and 8 letters sent for excessive speed (i.e. 45mph on a 30mph limit). The highest observation was 50mph on Tonbridge Road

Allotments - Following an inspection on Thursday 28 November an email had been sent to all plot holders mentioning that all but a few plots were in good condition and another inspection would be carried out before April 2014.

Cemetery - A site meeting was held on 28th November to discuss a new children's area in the cemetery. . A site was identified and Councillors discussed and agreed there would be no charge for burials from stillborn to 12 months for residents and non residents. There would be a charge of £60 from 12 months to 12 years for residents.

Hermitage Lane Development KCC Cllr Balfour said Kent County Council was concerned about the proposals for building in Hermitage Lane as this would affect the surrounding area. T & M Cllr Jessel stated it was felt Maidstone Borough Council was in some confusion over the Hermitage Lane planning proposals, and although it would probably still proceed the plans may be modified.

JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Drayhorse Meadow The appeal on the rating for Drayhorse Meadow was ongoing. The track leading to the pavilion would be monitored as it may be necessary to carry out some remedial work.

Crime Report - The following crimes had been recorded in December: a Burglary on Tonbridge Road (watch left on window ledge with window open). Criminal Damage at The Handy Stores where shelving was pulled over by a customer and a Theft when several conifer type trees were dug up and taken.

Speedwatch During December there had been 126 observations of vehicles travelling at over 35mph. This included 2nd detections 18, 3rd 2, 5th 1 and 7 for excessive speed of 45mph or above. Unfortunately no new volunteers had come forward to help with Speedwatch and without new people it may be difficult to keep it going. It was felt that not enough support was coming from the police to back Speedwatch and it was agreed to write to Commissioner Ann Barnes

Play Area Some research had been done on the cost of fencing the children's play area and TMBC had given some advice

The Sports Association had to turn down a request for a vehicle to use the playing fields for repairs to a fence belonging to a resident due to the ground being saturated.

A possible STOP sign at the gate exit on to Fields Lane from the playing field was raised and it was agreed to contact Kent Highways to see if a sign could be put on the road side of the gate. Some drivers were not taking enough care when leaving the track and joining the highway.

Finance The budget for 2014/15 was agreed and the Chairman told the meeting the precept figure

was down on last year.

Planning - No objection to application to add an extra floor over existing single storey garden room making a very small bedroom 4 into main bedroom with possible ensuite and fitted wardrobes - 20A Mill Lane. No objection to 2 storey side and rear extension - 16 Leney Road

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Tuesday 4 February in the ground floor meeting room of the village hall starting at 7.30pm. Residents are welcome to attend.

Good Vicars = Growing Churches

You may have heard of a recent debate concerning comments made by the Archbishop of Canterbury that where a good parish priest is present, churches grow. In an interview on the BBC's Today programme a few weeks ago, the Most Revd Justin Welby suggested that he was "extremely hopeful" about the future of the Church of England, despite falling numbers, partly because of "signs of growth in many places". He then said: "Of course there are churches that are doing better and churches that are struggling more, depending on area and on leadership. But the reality is that where you have a good vicar you will find growing churches." Wow! That is when discussions began amongst the clergy, as you can imagine. I must admit, I did reflect on my own position and asked questions of myself (as all vicars were probably doing)!

However, there is an unquestionable change in attitude and opinion towards the Christian Faith in this country but is this down to the local vicar? I personally believe that there are more issues to consider and that the answer is complex. For example, folk do not recognise the need for something spiritual, something beyond this world, in their fairly materialistic life. We have so much more opportunity to fill our time with most enjoyable social activities (many taking place on a Sunday). Issues differ from one region to another. I could go on and on.

Another view is that, whilst a good vicar equals growth, it may mean a bad vicar experiences church decline. I am sure, nevertheless, that the vicar has much bearing on church growth and church decline. On a personal level I would not wish to shy away from such responsibilities. I am called to be a leader of the church and that I should do.

So why aren't our churches full? Well, we are not doing too bad at Wateringbury, although we do have some room for you! However, perhaps we are not attractive enough or we are poor at encouraging folk inside the building, especially for that all important first visit. How we present our message may need improving. The Archbishop suggests we need to be flexible in how we engage locally and we also need to be very clear about our intention of growing our numbers. It doesn't happen accidentally.

I do believe that if we don't actually set out to grow the number of people and draw people to the reality of the love of God in Jesus Christ it doesn't just happen. But I am rather hoping you will pop along at some point to St John The Baptist, Wateringbury, see what we have to offer and put the Archbishop's theory to the test!
