PARISH MEETING –

WEDNESDAY 16 MAY - 7.30PM - VILLAGE HALL UPSTAIRS ROOM

This is less formal than a Parish Council meeting and gives residents the opportunity to raise any issues with the Council. We are fortunate to have Mr Ian Paterson of Action with Communities in Rural Kent who will give a presentation entitled 'Community Rail in the Medway Valley'. He will explain how the local Community Rail Partnership came to be set up, who is involved, what they have achieved, and future plans. He will focus on Wateringbury and on the Wateringbury Station Partnership and answer any questions raised. Refreshments will be provided.

APRIL PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

At the start of the meeting the Chairman announced that:

* The council meeting on **1 May** will be the annual meeting at which the chairman is appointed for the coming year and councillors are allocated to the various sub committees.

* The Annual Parish Meeting takes place on **Wednesday 16 May** in the upper room of the village hall at 7.30pm. The **guest speaker will be Ian Patterson who will talk on Community Rail, the Medway Valley Line and Wateringbury station.**

Diamond Jubilee Medals A sample of the medals was shown to councillors and the public. The Parish Council has donated a medal for each child in the school to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. The school have suggested that the medals are presented to the children by parish councillors at a date yet to be agreed.

Queen Elizabeth II Fields Trust To celebrate the village playing fields being listed under the scheme it was proposed that an event be held at the fields. Various dates, options and suggestions were discussed by the councillors and the public. It was decided to investigate some of the suggested possibilities and discuss the matter further at a future meeting.

Police Matters The village's new **PCSO Phillip Harrison** introduced himself to the meeting. He lives locally and has been a PCSO for 5 years. Prior to this he spent 18 years in the army. He said villagers would be able to meet him when he was patrolling the village. He believed that there were very few problems which cannot be resolved. He said he can be contacted via the new 101 police non emergency contact number.

PCSO Harrison reported that there had been 3 crimes reported in the village last month. Number plates had been stolen from a vehicle parked in commercial premises in Canon Lane; Power tools, Sat Nav and high visibility BT jackets had been stolen from a motor vehicle parked in Fields Lane and a double-decker bus had been broken into and driven round the station car park in a manner which caused damage to parked vehicles.

EDF Contract The terms of the council's 3 year contract with EDF relating to street lighting were discussed. It was decided to write to OFGEN to seek their advice.

Sports & Recreation Mike Witts reported to the council that the remedial work on 700 sq m of the playing fields has been completed, the top soil had been spread and turves laid, these were growing well. . It was a mammoth task and he thanked his 5 colleagues on the Sports and Recreation committee and the members of the cricket club for their help with the work. In October it was proposed to improve a further 1000 sq m of land by rotovating and sowing grass seed. Litter was proving a problem at the fields. It was suggested that another 'Bash the Trash' day be considered.

Village Hall Hire Charges Councillor Dennis Stones reported that the cost of hiring the hall will be increased from September 2012. The increase is a modest one of about 50p per hour (5%).

Highways and Transportation More volunteers are needed for the village speedwatch teams. More volunteers will mean that the teams will be able to do more sessions in the village envelope to make the roads safer for all.

High Pollution Levels The traffic lights at Wateringbury is the worst of the 8 areas in the borough with pollution levels higher than permitted. The cause is traffic emissions when there are queues of traffic waiting to get through the lights.

No 7 SUNDAY BUS SERVICE From 1 April there is a 2 hourly Sunday Service. Weekday times have been slightly changed. Travellers are advised to check before setting off.

Parish Partnership Panel Councillor Talbert reported that T & M borough council, which was an award winning council for the quality of its services, had written to the central government about the amount it receives from them. The national average is £51 per head, but T & M only receive £35.47, much lower than neighbouring boroughs.

There is a desperate shortage of foster parents in the area. The KCC would be pleased to hear from anyone who would like to know more about this worthwhile task.

The council welcomes members of the public to its meetings which are held in the village hall and start at 7.30pm: General Meeting Tuesday 1 May, 7.30pm, Annual Meeting Wednesday 16 May with guest speaker from Rail network.

STEP BACK IN TIME

VILLAGE CELEBRATIONS FOR THE QUEEN'S SILVER JUBILEE 1977

On 2 July The Parish Council and the Field Committee ran a Jubilee Fete at Wateringbury Field. Organisers Mrs Joyce Woodward and Mrs Dorothy Norris aimed to make this an "All Village" celebration and all organisations were invited to take part. A full and varied programme was arranged. At 1pm there was a Carnival Parade through the village, starting from the station. The Chatham Marine Cadet Band provided music for the procession. Following the band were the Jubilee Queen, and Princess. There was then a procession of floats, decorated cars, prams, cycles and wheelbarrows from people and organisations in the village. The parade reached the fields at about 2pm and the Fete began.

Rostrum printed a report of the event: "Despite adverse weather forecasts July 2 dawned fine and hot, in fact too hot for some. The parade of the band and floats assembled in the Station Car Park at 1.00pm organised by Tim Allen, for judging by Messrs Bevan and Leschallas. The band struck up, the Majorettes pirouetted and the procession proceeded up Bow Road and through the Village. The Rolls whispered along carrying Mrs Rogers who was the Seniors' Queen followed by the float from the School with the Princess (Dawn Unger) and her attendants. Then came the rest of the floats, the Scouts and Guides, the Working Men's Club, Allington and Orpines Estates and many others entered by various groups of villagers and individuals. The judging must have been difficult. After a very hot hour they all arrived at the field.

“The Queen cut the cake and celebrations started on Wateringbury Field at 2pm. Many stalls were evident; the Flower Club made a very colourful display in their tent; later these arrangements were auctioned and made a fine profit. The WI handicraft exhibition showed the wide-ranging talent around. The Seniors’ display of mementos of previous jubilees was much admired. The children’s painting, art and cookery looked good and a lot of effort was put into all exhibits. Still the sun beat down but undeterred the band marched and counter-marched and the Majorettes gave a display. The children’s fancy dress was a sight to see. Mrs Young (widow of Admiral Young of Gransden) judged the competition. Beer flowed freely and wisely and eventually ran out but no one complained.

“Just to prove Wateringbury could take it at 8pm until 1am there was a barbecue, again on the field. Mr and Mrs Norris again very much in evidence with many assistants and a very good, and not too noisy time was had by all.”

HISTORY SOCIETY

Our annual outing this year, on 16 May, is to the Chapel Down Winery, at Small Hythe, which includes a guided tour around the vineyards. We then move to Tenterden for lunch followed by a guided tour of the town. The ticket price is £21 per person, which includes the coach, the tour and tasting at the winery, and the tour of Tenterden, but not lunch. Visitors very welcome.

In March, David Carder came along to tell us about six 'Historic Kentish Towns'; Canterbury, Rochester, Dover, Sandwich, Tonbridge and Faversham. Each of these towns, with the exception of Faversham, had been walled, and all had been important for their markets. David showed us slides of ancient and modern maps which illustrated how the towns still retain much of their original layout with parts of walls, moats and towers still in place. David also showed us slides illustrating two or three historic buildings in each town, and explained the history, architecture and use of these buildings, and what they have become today. This gave us a wonderful insight into the lives of those who had lived in these towns in the past, and a chance to see the changes that have taken place from a historic perspective. David finished by saying we were extremely fortunate to live in Kent surrounded by so many places of historic interest, and suggested that we make it a priority to visit some of the places he had shown us. WEATHER

The dry, mild Spring continued in March with only 20mm of rain, less than half the average, making the last 6 months 135mm or 36% dryer than usual. The month opened with a balmy 15°C temperature, peaking to 20°C on 28th. Overall this March's average was 2°C warmer than usual for this time of year.

We probably have the Jet Stream to thank for this as it had a semi-circular northerly kink in it which kept high pressure close by. However it now seems to be reverting to its usual west to east flow which has allowed low pressure systems to come in from the west. As for April, the 22mm of hail stones on the 11th was a bit of a surprise but helped towards the total precipitation for the first half of April of 31mm. If this is kept up for the rest of the month it will be the first month of above average rainfall this year. WWW

Pray? Who us?

Who would have thought that tough macho football supporters would have spoken the religious language of prayer? Well, it happened following the recent collapse on the pitch by a Bolton Wanderers hero, Fabrice Muamba. Now his family is exhorting the country to believe in the power of prayer, and I suspect many millions of Britons, whether they have faith or not, will have felt moved to offer a silent appeal to an invisible power asking that the young footballer pull through his ordeal. Bolton Wanderers and Muamba's friends and relatives have said they have been touched by the out-pouring of goodwill towards the player. His club manager Owen Coyle said: "Everybody is praying for Fabrice, which is very important, and that has been a real source of strength to the family."

The dreadful sight of a young, apparently healthy, athlete collapsing in front of tens of thousands of football fans is a sharp reminder of the unpredictability of all our lives. We can never be in total control of our destiny and so, like generations before us, at times of stress or crisis we look to the heavens in the search for meaning and hope. This often means that we resort to prayer.

I don't want to get in to the discussion, in this particular article, about why did God save Muamba but did not use his miraculous powers to save 22 children who died in a coach crash recently. Interesting as that may well be, I am simply fascinated that this incident on a football pitch, in front of a worldwide audience on TV, resulted in such a wave of Prayer. It has been so refreshing and encouraging to hear folk of all ages and irrespective of gender speaking religious talk! It says to me that there is a basic human desire for a supernatural involvement in matters of health and wellbeing. Christians call this God.

I am often asked by the most unlikely folk to "send one up for me, Vicar!". When they begin to engage with me in such a way I am more than aware that they themselves are praying to God, although they are not able to articulate it themselves and acknowledge their belief.

In a recent survey commissioned by the Church of England 2,000 people were asked "What do you pray for?". A quarter said a family member and a similar number said World Peace. One in ten wanted forgiveness. Only 15 per cent said they would not pray at all! If that is the case then I shouldn't be surprised when a football stadium is transformed into a powerhouse of prayer. It also means that 85% of you will be praying to God at some stage, for some reason. Thank you for that but, if you would prefer, I would always "send one up" for you.
