Our St George's Day assembly took place in front of the flagpole on 23rd April with our scouts in uniform. MAY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

There being only 6 nominations for the 9 vacancies on the parish council the following were returned unopposed. Mike Cayzer, David Marks, Lin Simons, Chris Talbert, Richard Tripp and Michael Wells. There are therefore 3 opportunities for residents to actively contribute to village life by joining the Parish Council.

Mike Cayzer was elected Chairman for the next 12 months. Dennis Stones and Jean Smith did not stand again for Council and the Chairman thanked them for their efforts on behalf of the village. Chairman's report will appear in next Rostrum.

There had been a meeting with Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council re problems of parking in the car park. No suitable solution had been found. Councillors discussed quotes received for completion of the overflow car park at the playing fields. It was agreed to get the views of the Sports Association at the next meeting. It was considered repairs to the track leading to the playing fields was more urgent at this time.

Council agreed that Michael Williams' request to clean the village signs be accepted and the Council would make an ex gratia payment to cover the cost of materials. Mr Williams agreed he would carry out the work entirely at his own risk and the Chairman thanked him.

Japanese Knotweed has been found to be growing in the allotments and also in the churchyard. Council agreed to instruct James Woolley to treat both areas. The problem of Ragwort growing the field adjacent to the Drayhorse Meadow was raised. Following correspondence with the owner of the field, it was agreed to ensure any Ragwort growing on Council land be treated and then to go back and discuss again with the owner of the middle field if it theirs had not been treated

Councillors agreed to register an interest in a Pilot Local Warden Support Officer scheme

She had been suffering a long illness before being admitted into the hospital on 20th April. All the remaining four children, Diane, Gary, Roland and myself Shane plus all the grandchildren will miss her dearly.

UNEXPECTED REUNION Ted and Doreen Vincent were recently on a family outing to Dover Transport Museum and were nearing the end of their visit when they came upon a motorcycle in a display case, and to their amazement realised that it was the 1923 Levis registration KK 4935 which Ted had lovingly restored.

The motorcycle had been purchased new in 1923 from Heath Engineering, Horsmonden by the mother of Ted's great friend Roy Thompsett. Mrs Thompsett rode the bike until 1935 when it was put into one of the barns at the family's Fox Hole Farm in Matfield. Some years later when Ted was visiting the farm he saw the bike and told his friend that if ever he wanted to part with it he would love to restore the motorcycle. Then about a year before he retired from Matfield Garage Ted received a call from Roy and acquired the bike which was in a sorry state. Ted stripped it down and retrieved all the re-usable parts, some were sand blasted and re-sprayed, the chrome parts were nicol plated; the engine needed extensive work and the magneto was re-wired. The front wheel had rusted away but luckily, through the Vintage Motor Cycle Club which Ted had joined, a replacement was traced in Poole. Fortunately the spokes were easily replaced as they were standard bicycle ones. When the restoration was complete Ted rode it round his garden.

Upon Ted and Doreen's down-sizing move to Watlington he dismantled the motorcycle and packed it away. Eventually Ted made the decision to sell the Levis and a buyer was found in Ramsgate. It was this man who loaned the machine to the Museum. The Vincents told the museum staff of Ted's part in restoring the machine and they were delighted to meet him and hear the story.

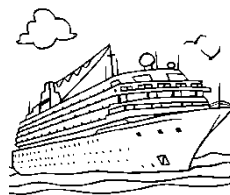

REDEVELOPMENT OF ABBEYFIELD INTO A BLOCK OF FLATS

There is a plan to demolish Abbeyfield Residential Care Home, move the residents elsewhere, and built a 55 flat block in its place in the Orpines. There is to be an "exhibition" about the plan for locals on Monday June 1st from 2pm until 6.30 pm at the Railway Tavern in Bow Road. Any concerns you may have may be expressed to the Parish Council. Note that the next Parish Council meeting is Tuesday 2nd June.

Suffice to say that the local residents are up in arms at the fact that we have not been notified of this and the exhibition has not been widely advertised and is during mainly working and commuting hours in a pub! What is important is that the event is known. The information I have in the text above comes from the letter sent to the Parish Council this week so is correct but it will take time to be discussed and appear in Council business. I have not detailed the nature of the block of flats because that is really for them to do. There has already been an emergency residents' meeting and there is universal concern on many levels about the size and scale of development and the speed of the consultation process. No building regs papers have arrived but the letter of intention has been publishes and newspapers run so my message is in the interest of local civic responsibility.

PILOT ERROR.....

At 6.30 in the morning our calm repose was shattered by an almighty bang, akin to an explosion, followed by a noise resembling the destruction of a sizable dinner service all to the accompaniment of a slivering, sliding thump!

Thus rudely awaken I urgently sought an answer to the unholy racket and found it in the shape of a swan stomping about on the lawn below amidst the litter of wrecked Kent peg tiles.

I would guess that the swan had taken off late from the Mill Pond (we live next to it), barely cleared our hedge but lacked sufficient height to avoid the cottage's roof leaving a sizable hole as its crash site. It is difficult to explain how a swan can look disgruntled but it was managing this feat impressively whilst conducting a thorough search of the garden for a way out. In this I obliged by opening our gate having assured myself that it appeared to be unharmed.

By now fully awake my next thought was to find a copy of *The Rostrum* for the number of a local roofing contractor; and a discussion with my Wife as to earliest we could intrude on his breakfast by telephoning. He later told us that our call was one of the funniest he had for a long time.

B C Marshall offers not only a local service but a speedy and very modestly priced one too; he called out to us later that same day sized up the damage and returned the next to effect repairs - excellent and to be recommended, just make sure that there is plenty of tea on hand. As a postscript I half expected his advert (which appears in *Rostrum*) to include 'repairs to swan damage' to the services offered and as a moral to this always keep a copy of *The Rostrum* to hand in case of need.

War News, May 1915

This was the first month of multiple war deaths for Wateringbury. Both **Richard Heath** (promoted to lance-corporal the day before his death), from Canon Lane, of the Royal Marines and Private **Ernest Sales**, from Old Road, of the Worcestershire Regiment died on the same day, five days after the initial landings in Gallipoli. Both were mature military professionals: Richard, 39 at his death, enlisted in 1894; Ernest, 29, enlisted in 1905. Both were Wateringbury born, into families engaged in trade (Richard's father was a house painter; Ernest's a fishmonger) and both attended Wateringbury School.

Also at Gallipoli but surviving were: Ernest Jennings, a recruit in 1914 to the Hood battalion of the Royal Naval Division (RND) was wounded at Gallipoli on 17th May; and Captain Richard Brocklebank, a professional soldier in the 9th Lancers, photographed, in good health with his 4 brothers at Wateringbury Place in 1916, after returning from Gallipoli.

Another war fatality, but not at Gallipoli, came on 27 May when H.M.S. Princess Irene, converted by the navy to a minelayer, blew up near Sheerness, probably as a

result of mines being primed in a hurry; 352 were killed including **George Hearn**. Although not Watlingbury born or educated, he had married a Watlingbury girl, Louisa, who was living at the time of his death in Pizenwell. He joined the navy in 1906 and was 29 when he died.

Back home, Victor Goodwin, with the Army Service Corps (A.S.C.) was arrested in Watlingbury on 5th May for being absent without leave and was remanded to await an escort by Malling magistrates. He had been awarded a good attendance certificate at school and won three events at the [Empire Day sports in 1906!](#)

James Sales, Ernest's elder brother, was prosecuted for using obscene language in the village on 22nd May and fined 21 shillings (£1.05 but equivalent to over £100 in today's money).

The vicar in the May 1915 parish magazine wrote: "I want to take this opportunity of publishing the names of those of our young men at home who have already felt the call and have offered themselves but have been rejected on medical grounds. Otherwise their staying at home might be misunderstood by those who would not know the facts." He lists 16 men by name. Probably it was related to the white feather campaign which had started in August 1914, when 30 women went onto the streets of Folkestone with white feathers, which they gave to men not in uniform. I suspect this type of behaviour caused much unpleasantness, even in a village like Watlingbury. Terry Bird

HISTORY SOCIETY

In June, Chris Jupp will be coming along to tell us about the "Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment", his talk will follow our short Annual General Meeting. Visitors very welcome

Our talk in April entitled "Everest Pioneer" was given by Sandra Noel, whose father Captain John Noel had made two expeditions to Mount Everest, one whilst serving in the army in North India in 1913 and the second in 1924, which was sponsored by the Royal Geographical Society. On each expedition Captain Noel had not only taken with him food, very basic clothing and walking aids, but also his camera and photo developing equipment. For the first expedition John had learned to speak the local dialects, had organised guides and planned the route to Everest, the trip took place during leave from the army, unfortunately it over-ran by a month and he only escaped a court martial because of the start of WWI, in which he served.

Captain Noel remained in the army until 1922, when he resigned from his commission, in order to make his second planned expedition to Everest. Sandra

showed us, through both black and white and hand painted coloured photographs taken and developed by her father during the expeditions, exactly what had been experienced by the many people involved. For the second expedition, silk underwear was worn for extra warmth and also camel hair sleeping bags were used but the conditions were still very grim at times, and accidents and fatal injuries occurred.

On returning to England he bought a derelict house in Smarden, and he spent many happy years restoring this and other properties. Captain Noel died aged 99 years and although his expeditions did not reach the summit of Everest they paved the way for the later successful expeditions. JH

FUN AT THE EASTER PROJECT

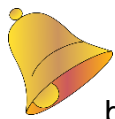
Not even the coldness of the weather could dampen the spirits of the 63 children attending this year's event. The church experienced a buzz of excitement and enjoyment throughout the morning.

CHALLENGING POVERTY

About 2.7 billion people, over a third of the world's population, live on less than U.S.\$2 a day. It causes 21,000 child deaths per day. Over the last year, there has been an increased awareness of the plight of the poor and 2015 will be a particularly significant year for poverty. In May the Pope called on the United Nations to initiate a "worldwide ethical mobilization" that would address the plight of the poor. The Millennium Development Goals (agreed by the United Nations in 2000 and whose aim was to eradicate extreme poverty and hunger by 2015) are to be revisited and redefined in 2015.

Although some people feel the UK economy is picking up, this isn't true for many. The number of people using foodbanks continues to grow (One estimate reaches 1 million). The Bishop of Truro and Frank Field MP chaired the all party parliamentary group which produced the report 'Feeding Britain' calling upon the government to eliminate food poverty in Britain by 2020. "Listen to God: Hear the Poor" was an initiative launched by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Cardinal Archbishop of

Westminster last April when the Archbishops were encouraging churches to join them in praying for the work of the Church helping those in need.

Churches in our Diocese are encouraging us all to raise awareness of poverty by understanding the reasons and discovering how God blesses the poor. So important, however, is to explore how we might respond. So communities and parishes are encouraged to explore the theme in creative, innovative and eye-catching ways, involving local communities where possible. Already a number of folk in our church at Wateringbury have undertaken "Living Below the Line" challenge (living on £1 per day for 5 days) to enable them to experience the hardships of life in poverty. There has also been conferences where we have learned more about poverty and what can be done to tackle it. We also manage our own food bank scheme.

Poverty is challenging and complex. Over the years, countless lives have been transformed when poverty is confronted. The challenges may seem overwhelming, but we really can make a difference as we seek justice for the poor and food for the hungry towards our commitment to tackle the causes and effects of poverty in different parts of the world.

I pray that Challenging Poverty will provide opportunities to make that difference.
