WAR NEWS SEPTEMBER 1916

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| September 15: First use of tanks. 20: Russian offensive against Austria-Hungary ends. 23: Zeppelin raids on England cause 170 casualties |
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After the June fruit picking holiday school was open throughout July and August, closing on 25th August for five weeks hopping holiday. The shortage of men meant the hopping "passed off quietly", but also caused a rise in juvenile delinquency. Hoppers had more money to spend in 1916 at the hopping stalls, but the takings of the village pubs must have been well down. In a raid by the police on Hermitage Farm, four "immigrant hoppers" (meaning not from Watringbury) were found to be army deserters and were arrested. No Hoppers hospital operated this year but a dispensary with a nurse did.

September was for the village the bloodiest month of the Somme Offensive. The vicar comments "What an anxious time this is for all who have boys at the front. They are not allowed to know for certain where they are, whether in the Great Offensive on the Somme or elsewhere." Censorship was now more stringent and the vicar no longer published letters in the village magazine.

On 5th September **Albert Herbert**, aged 19, was killed in the assault on Guillemont. His parents had just moved to Watringbury, his father working in the Gas Works at the bottom of Bow Road. He was a regular soldier in the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry and had been involved in many of the Western front's earlier battles. His parents were still seeking news about him the following year.

On 15th September, **Thomas Weller**, 22, was killed at Ginchy. He went to Watringbury School but his family had moved from Hermitage Farm to West Malling. He was in the prestigious Royal Grenadier Guards. On the same day and at the same place as Thomas was killed so too was Raymond Asquith, the prime minister's son, and Harold MacMillan was severely wounded. (Prime Minister 1957-63)

On 27th September **Lewis Newman**, 34, was one of 42 men from his battalion of the Royal West Kents killed by a single shell as they massed in trenches to assault Thiepval. Lewis had attended Watringbury School but the family moved from Cannon Lane to Mereworth. He was a volunteer who had enlisted just after the war began, rising through the ranks to sergeant.

On 29th September **William Cowlard**, 27, was killed. He had moved to Watringbury just before the war to work in the Kent Brewery. Married with 2 children, he only enlisted in April 1916 and was probably a conscript rather than a volunteer. In the Yorkshire Regiment he saw tanks in action for the first time. Further tragedy followed as his infant son was fatally burnt at home in Vicarage Cottages the following year.



None of the four have a known grave, but all are commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial.

JULY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Dispensation - At the start of the meeting Councillor Dennis Stones declared interests in 3 areas which are considered by the council from time to time. After discussions Councillors agreed he could speak but not vote on matters relating to The Pear Orchard and the Village Fete and speak and vote on any items relating to the Village Hall. These dispensations will be for the life of the present council.

Allotments - All allotments were now being rented. Councillor John Evans was thanked for repairing the gate latch.

Borough Councillor Simon Jessel reported that he and others had raised objections to T & M Planning Committee's decision to grant permission for the Greensted redevelopment plan. The decision will now be the subject of an independent review.

Crime Report - A letter had been received informing the Council that the police would no longer give written reports of monthly crime statistics. The Clerk was instructed to write to the police informing them that Councillors were unhappy with this decision.

Glebe Meadow Play Area - A resident had requested the Council fence a small area of land near her property. Councillors decided that this piece of land is not owned by the Parish and therefore the Council is not responsible for erecting a fence.

Planning - Council had no objections to the alterations to elevations and change of cladding material at 10 Upper Mill. Council expressed concerns about the line of site for vehicles joining Red Hill as detailed in the revised design to that approved for the erection of a 4 bedroom dwelling and detached double garage at 18 Red Hill.

Village Hall - Councillor Stones reported that 2 regular bookings had been lost to other halls due to the problems of parking in the village car park which was owned and managed by Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council.

Public Discussion - Matters raised were:

Overgrown vegetation from properties restricting already narrow pavements.

Possibilities for creating more car parking within the village.

Provision of Dog Warden contact details in the Rostrum magazine.

The Council were thanked for initiating the new surfaces around play equipment at the playing fields.

Pam and I have just returned from five days in France, visiting a place called Puy du Fou which is regarded as 'France's best-kept secret' – but one which more folk from England and elsewhere ought to discover. It presents outstanding pageants, indoors and out, of historical events in ways which are dramatic and spectacular. There are seven major

presentations each lasting about half-an-hour, featuring Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table, the Vikings, a mediaeval tale with jousting and battles, the Musketeers of Richelieu, an aerial fantasy acted out by 170 birds from owls to eagles, and the destiny of an 18th century French naval officer in which the whole theatre containing 2,500 people moved sideways and upwards with, clearly, some amazing engineering. It is almost impossible to describe.

My favourite, which I saw twice two years ago and again this time, was an enactment of the Roman Games in a fabulously constructed Coliseum holding 6,000 of us, with chariot races, a triumphal procession with live animals – oxen, geese, emus and leopards among them – and an illustration of the persecution of Christians being fed to the lions, again with live animals and Christians caged or tied to the stake. It reminded me that there is still persecution of those of our faith two thousand years later, as there has been through the centuries, with violent attacks in India, churches burned and converts threatened, harassed and abused, Christians imprisoned in Iran, Sudan and Nigeria, and Chinese officials closing churches because they are 'a security threat' to next month's G20 summit.

I have been recently reading an account of the persecution of the Church in Madagascar during the 19th century – but through it all the church grew: 'men, women and children were hunted down, slain by the spear, poisoned, hurled over a precipice, flogged, burnt, exiled in heavy chains, reduced to hunger and poverty, hundreds were killed, thousands were flogged and fined . . . but still the church grew' (Couriers of Christ: J C Harris)

We have no such problems in our own country – but that should make us aware of the difficulties which do exist in other places, and that should make it the subject of our prayers and, where possible, our practical support: there are certainly agencies which invite our support as well as our concern.

Perhaps one of our failings is complacency, and not least in our own Christian commitment: with the coming of a new Incumbent for our three churches in this benefice, maybe those of us who regard ourselves as part of the Christian community here in Watlington, or at least supportive of it, can ask what it is that each of us has to offer to the life, work and worship of the church in this place, and be prepared to commit to it, whatever the cost.
