SEPTEMBER PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Cemetery Additional work on trees to be carried out.

Crime Report The following crimes were reported in August: Burglary - male arrested at junction of Bow Road/Tonbridge Road in connection with burglary at the hairdressers which had a window smashed. Burglary - at the yard in Red Hill where assorted plumbing fittings, brass and copper had been removed. Fire - large amount of discarded tyres set alight on a farm in Canon Lane. An empty bottle of fire ignition fluid found nearby. Anti Social Behaviour - report of loud music near the crossroads details of environmental health given to informants.

County Councillor Matt Balfour replied to a question on Operation Stack saying Kent County Council did not think the use of Manston Airport, which had been put forward by Cobra, was a good idea. It was hoped the County Council would be reimbursed by Central Government for the costs involved.

Demolition of Greensted The question of the demolition of Greensted was raised. Members of the public were asked for their views. Discussions involved the size of the proposed new building, parking, amounts of traffic and the upheaval to the existing residents. **Borough Councillor Simon Jessel** said lots of comments on Greensted had been received by Robin Gilbert, Senior Planning Officer, and the planning application would probably come up before the Area 2 Planning Committee sometime in mid November.

Planning The Council had no objections to: External alterations at 226 Tonbridge Road; Demolition of existing conservatory and erection of two storey rear extension at 51 Phoenix Drive; Two storey extension, orangery, single store rear extension at 79 Canon Lane and Single storey extension at 92 Phoenix Drive.

Demolition of existing Greensted Residential Care Home and erection of 55 Old Peoples' Extra Care units (C2 use Class), associated communal facilities, landscaping and parking The Council objected on the following grounds:

1. Size contrary to Policy CP24 and S01 of DPD and requiring parking and vehicular access not adequately provided by the application in its present form
2. Appearance contrary to Para 58 of NAPS
3. Orientation producing overlooking and loss of privacy detrimental to the built environment and amenity of the locality contrary to Policy CP24

Playing Fields Council agreed to employ RSS a company that will carry out regular inspections of the play equipment and also maintain it.

A site meeting was held with Abacus to look at replacing the existing bark surface at the play equipment area with wet pour. The cost could be in the region of £38,000. It was agreed to look at the cost of replacing bark over the next years to see which would be most cost effective.

Local residents are very welcome to attend the next meetings of the Parish Council. The regular monthly meeting will be on **Tuesday 6 October at the later start time of 8pm**. On **Tuesday 13 October the Finance and General Purposes Committee** meets at 7.30pm. Both meetings are in the ground floor room at the village hall.

WATERINGBURY SPORTS AND RECREATION ASSOCIATION RENOVATION OF THE PLAYING FIELDS.

If you have visited the Playing Fields recently you will have discovered that an area of 7,000 sq. metres has been leveled, seeded and a barrier fence erected. This work carried out by James Woolley and his colleagues completes the phased renovation of the main playing field which was commenced in the Spring of 2012.

WSRA successfully applied for grants to cover the cost for the latest phase of £4,720 excl.VAT. We wish to thank TMBC for providing £1,420 from their "Community Enhancement Fund Grant scheme" which paid for the seed and the barrier fence components. Our thanks go to Matthew Balfour our County Councillor on whose recommendation WSRA received £3,200 from the "KCC's Member Grants Scheme". This amount covered the cost of the leveling and seeding works.

WAR NEWS, LATE SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 1915

September

25 British offensive at Loos, on Western front.

28 Britain defeats Ottomans in Mesopotamia.

October

5 British and French troops landed at Salonika, Greece.

6 French offensive at Champagne, on Western front.

12 Execution in Brussels of Nurse Edith Cavell.

18 Third Battle of Isonzo, Italy.

Village life in September was dominated by the hopping which in 1915 lasted from 2nd to 29th September. The parish magazine gives a detailed report, noting "there were fewer pickers than usual" and the hops were "heavier and better than expected". Most of the normal support infrastructure for the hoppers in the village (club rooms; stalls at the station, Canon Court and vicarage) continued as usual, but the lantern shows were discontinued. The hospital, set up in Westbury Cottage, had 10 inpatients including many babies, and a daily average of 32 outpatients; because of the war obtaining nurses was a problem, but **Elsie Blest** from Broomscroft, Canon Lane, volunteered and was in the 1918 New Year's Honours list for her subsequent nursing on the Western Front.

Late September saw the deaths of **William Head** on the 25th, **Frederick Relf**, also on the 25th and **Arthur Jukes** on the 28th. All had attended Wateringbury School, were all in their early twenties and single. William and Arthur both came from Old Road; Frederick from Phoenix Cottages, Nettlestead (by the Railway pub). At the time of the 1911 census William was an insurance clerk, Frederick a domestic gardener and Arthur a butcher.

Frederick, in the Rifle Brigade, and Arthur, in the Coldstream Guards, had joined up after the war started; William, in the London Regiment, had enlisted as a part-time Territorial before the war and then volunteered for overseas service after the war began. William and Arthur were killed in the Battle of Loos in France and Frederick died 25 miles away, in Belgium at Ploegsteert, close to where Henry Bingham Stevens had been killed a week earlier (see September's *Rostrum*).

Arthur's body was not found and in August 1916, 11 months after the battle, the parish magazine reports: *We also heard that Arthur Jukes' parents had received official notice that the War Office had given up all hope of his having survived the battle of Loos.* Otherwise they get little individual recognition in the parish magazine.

What was felt important enough to fill a complete edition of the parish magazine was a detailed report on a spiritual *Mission* in the village. In previous years this had been a whole week of prayers and preaching, but in 1915 was limited to a long weekend from 22nd to 26th October. Some of the services were for women or men only; the vicar was keen to continue men-only services.
