He was nominated by Joanna Fyson, Wateringbury Group Scout Leader, for his services to Scouting, including camping out for 100 consecutive nights during the winter of 2004, raising £1,400 for Demelza House Hospice. James went to Wateringbury School and then to Dorton House School for those with visual impairment in Seal. Having enjoyed his time in our cub and scout groups James has overcome his personal handicaps to become a sectional helper with the Beavers.

Paul Smart – Wateringbury's (veteran!) Motorcycle ace, recently went to Italy as a guest of honour for World Ducati Week. Part of the celebrations were to mark the 40th anniversary of the superbike race when, in Ducati's first entry into superbike racing, Paul won the race and his Ducati team-mate Bruno Spaggiari was second. JUNE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Village Youth Club - Robin, a Youth Club Leader, reported to councillors on the activities of the club which meets in the School Hall on Wednesday Evenings. There are 2 parents who help on a regular basis but more helpers would be much appreciated and would allow further expansion of activities. The Chairman expressed his thanks to those who helped with the club and assured Robin that the club had the full support of the Council. Crime – there were 7 reported crimes in the village during May: Theft of metal piping from a secure yard in Red Hill; Burglary from a motor cruiser moored at Bow Bridge Marina when 5 life jackets were stolen; Theft of a Blue VW Sharan (MF 51 HAE) which was parked overnight in Tonbridge Road; Theft of a water pump from a pumping station in Red Hill; Theft of fuel from a motor vehicle parked in Old Road; Burglary at a property in Bow Road and Vehicle interference when a car parked in the driveway of a property in Bow Road had a window smashed and its ignition barrel forced.

Joint Parish Councils' Traffic Consultative Group – Councillor Dennis Stones agreed to join Charles Stroud at these meetings. The main points discussed at the last meeting were the 20 year battle to persuade the Government to build a new slip road at Junction 5 on the M25 to allow west bound traffic to exit to the A21. The next meeting will be held in Kings Hill.

Parish Partnership Panel – Councillor Talbert reported on the meeting he had attended on 17 May. Two matters which were of particular interest to Wateringbury were:

Make Kent Quicker – Wateringbury is one of the areas across Kent which has **slow Broadband speeds**. The telephone exchange needs to be upgraded. The KCC are urging residents to vote online to ensure that our area is prioritised. Register your support at www.makekentquicker.com

British Red Cross Community Emergency Response Teams The Red Cross is working closely with KCC to set up teams in every town and village in Kent to support the local community in times of crisis with first aid, practical help and emotional support. No experience is needed and free training will be given. Anyone from the village who is interested in volunteering should telephone 0800 0280 831 or email enquirieskentand_sussex@redcross.org.uk in both instances ask for the Emergency Response Team Manager.

Allotments – the vacant plot has been let.

KCC Councillor Richard Long reported that there was a proposal for dropped kerbs on the A 26 in the area near to the church to help residents cross the road since a pedestrian crossing was not considered a viable option. Councillors considered that as the pavements were very narrow the proposed dropped kerbs would be more of a hindrance than a help. They suggested consideration be given to a 20 mph speed limit and changing the road surface to “rumble strips” to alert drivers to the 30 mph zone. Councillor Long said he would report the council's concerns and suggestions back to the KCC department concerned. The KCC is going ahead with the installation of an interactive sign on Red Hill.

T & M Borough Councillor Simon Jessel reported on matters of local interest. He had recently been appointed to serve on the Transport Planning Committee

Planning – The council had no objections to the following applications: Detached Garage and Storage building - North Pole Inn: New Garage and Store at Gransden, Tonbridge Road: External Canopies for extensions and alterations to existing rear additions including new pitched roof at Lodge Cottage, Tonbridge Road and Single Storey Front WC extension at 23 Barming Road.

The council objected to the application for the erection of a new dwelling bungalow with annex at ground floor and room in roof at 21 Barming Road.

Next Meeting will be in the village hall at 7.30pm on **Tuesday 3 July**. The public are always welcome at the Parish Council's meetings. Please note there will be no meeting in August.

MRS JENNY HERBERT

Mrs. Herbert, or Mrs. Curtis as she was then (and even now I constantly lapse and refer to Jenny as Mrs. Curtis) joined us at Wateringbury School in September 1988. As a School, we were not doing very well. We were just five teachers, two secretaries, a cleaner-in-charge and 138 children in four and a half classes. We'd had a grim Inspection and needed staff, following several resignations. Jenny had an impressive application, interviewed well and had excellent references. On the day we held the interviews, she had had other appointments elsewhere - the then Head of Halling C.E. School, Iain Stewart, was very keen on making an appointment. As soon as Mrs. Curtis (you see I'm still doing it) left us for home, I rang her house and kept the telephone ringing, so that no-one else could offer her a post before we did.

Jenny accepted the job immediately, and over the time we worked together, Jenny proved us right. One of the first things she did was enrol her children, Andrew and Jacqueline, demonstrating her commitment to, and her belief in the school. If you need any proof, then just look around the School. Jenny is a gifted teacher, devoted to her pupils, positive in outlook and vision, but most of all approachable and normal. Her classroom was always a bright, interesting haven of calm, teaching both children and their parents. She was everything I could have hoped for as my Deputy, and should really have progressed further in the Profession. The Education Service have lost out in not appointing Jenny to a senior position – Headteacher or Inspector perhaps - which she certainly deserved and earned, many times over.

Jenny's modesty would cause her to deny this and would be accompanied by a blush, a nervous smile and a quick change of subject. Over the last twenty one years, no one person has made a greater impact or influence on the hundreds of those children, parents and staff who have passed through the School as has Jenny Herbert. As a school, Wateringbury Church of England Primary is now bursting at the seams. It is the school of choice for many in the district and has a massive waiting list. It now has high records of achievement both in external examination and national tests, but perhaps more important, something far less tangible in that it has produced outstandingly steady, normal people ready and able to take their places in Society. Jenny Herbert is a great lady of Wateringbury. She has my admiration, praise and thanks for what she has done for us over her many years at School. Richard Arnold

HISTORY SOCIETY

Headcorn's main street boasts many old houses, some dating back as far as the late 1500's, and the influence of the architectural design used in each century could clearly be seen. During the tour we went into our Guide's historic cottage to view the original carved beams still in place. Our tour ended at the Church which has a magnificent vaulted ceiling and several stained glass windows which fortunately were not damaged during WWII bombing.

During the Jubilee Weekend we had a stall in the Church, where as well as displaying historic information about the village, we were also selling our publications. On Monday, Syd Thompsett and Terry Bird both led a guided walk around the village, fortunately in dry weather. For those who missed the tours, we have produced a self-guided version of the walk, which includes many items of historic interest, copies of which can be purchased from the Post Office. Overall it was a very enjoyable and successful weekend for the History Society and we would like to thank all those who helped us at the Church. WATERINGBURY SCHOOL STATUS CHANGE CONSULTATION

The Governing Body of Wateringbury Church of England school is considering changing its status to become a voluntary aided (VA) school. The Governors want to gain powers over admissions appeals to better manage class sizes in the school and they also want to strengthen the Church ethos. As the government is encouraging, and in some cases requiring, all schools to become independent of local authority control, the status of the school and the powers of its Governing Body are quickly becoming important issues when planning how to provide the best education for children.

Details about the reasons for this consideration are available from the school office and letters page of the school website. This is shortly to include a detailed list of questions and answers received as a result of the consultation evenings and initial publicity. Interested members of the local communities are encouraged to find out more and express any views about this. The final deadline for the initial public consultation is **4 July 2012**. Should the Governors proceed to propose a change, this will be publically announced, advertised locally and there would follow a statutory 6-week period for final consideration.
