## **WATERINGBURY WEATHER WATCH OCTOBER/NOVEMBER**

Since a very wet June and an above average July the last 3 months have been much drier than usual. In August, September and October we had a total of 91.2mm (3.59") of rain as compared to an average of 191.1mm (7.53"). However September and October were both warmer than usual.

The first half of November also produced hardly any rain although a lot of low cloud and mist made it feel damp and miserable at times. On the other hand it was much warmer than average. But whether or not this will last remains to be seen as last year the cold did not kick in until the second half of the month with the snow starting on the 29<sup>th</sup>. AB

## **HISTORY SOCIETY**

In December we are holding a Members' Social Evening, when we will be enjoying short talks from local residents, taking part in a quiz, and drinking wine (if wished) in place of tea and coffee accompanied by mince pies and nibbles.

Our first speaker in the New Year is James Gibson who is coming along on 18 January to tell us about the History of Rochester Bridge. Dr Gibson has been the Bridge Archivist since 1987 and is a member of the Rochester Bridge Trust.

Barbara Stevens came along in October to tell us about Downe village and its most famous resident Charles Darwin and his family. She told us that in 1842, when Darwin moved to Down House, around 330 people lived in Downe, the population has now risen to over 1,000. It is still a picturesque village and the High Street has changed very little since Darwin's time. It was suggested that Downe become a World Heritage Site, but a committee sitting in Brazil, could not reach an agreement so the decision has been postponed. Charles Darwin moved into Down House with his wife Emma in 1842, where they lived with

their family, until Charles died in 1882. Darwin and his wife, Emma Wedgewood, were cousins and both 30 years old when they married, they produced ten children, but unfortunately three died in childhood. Charles worked on and formulated his famous ideas on evolution whilst living at Down House, using the evidence he collected during his voyage on the "Beagle", and from the experiments he conducted in his garden. Both the house and gardens have been preserved as they were during his occupancy. Following his death Charles was interred in Westminster Abbey, much against Emma's wishes, but a memorial to Charles can be seen in the local Church.

## POPPY THE TAWNY OWL

After the Remembrance Service some of the children spied an owl crouching in the undergrowth in the churchyard. The owl was unable to fly and adults were recruited to help. It was put into a box and taken to Folly Wildlife Rescue near Tunbridge Wells. The owl was named Poppy. She was found to be in a very poor condition and unable to feed and therefore too weak to fly. The cause of the problem was diagnosed as canker of the mouth, which apparently is caused by eating wood pigeons or collared doves who carry the disease. Treatment was started but sadly Poppy died the next day. She was however in very loving hands and free from stress.

Every year she sells tickets for the Wateringbury Player's Pantomime; she used to be key holder to the village hall and has run the box-office for all of the 'plays what I wrote' including the Waterbrat productions. I have watched her, without a hint of hassle, calm down anxious customers who have forgotten their pin numbers, patiently waiting for them to recover their wits. No matter how busy, Penny and her staff always have a friendly word for all, making a visit to their emporium a real pleasure.

Now I have a very special personal thank you to express. Penny has recently been selling copies of my book for me (THE HAUNTING OF HARRIET – unabashed advert!) and has sold an amazing 20 copies to date! I am deeply indebted to her for providing such an efficient service. How many villages are privileged to boast of such a wonderful asset? ## NOVEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

*The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk, Redhill Cottage, Redhill or e-mail [susan\\_jc@btinternet.com](mailto:susan_jc@btinternet.com) Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which is held directly after the monthly parish council meeting in the village hall on the first Tuesday of each month.*

**Queen Elizabeth 2 Fields Challenge** the clerk reported that to date 63 people had supported the plan to register the village playing fields under the scheme to mark the Queen's Jubilee by protecting open spaces for future generations. It was hoped that before the closing date of 16 November more support would be received on the dedicated web site.

**October Crime figures** PCSO Dave Gilham reported to the meeting that there had been 5 crimes - 3 thefts from motor vehicles parked overnight at the Premier Inn and 1 catalytic converter stolen from a vehicle parked in Warden Mill Close. The fifth crime was a vehicle not paying for fuel from the service station. Dave reported that the police were being restructured at the moment so for the time being the monthly police surgery in the village will be suspended.

**Replacement of Village sign top** discussions took place about replacing the stolen KCC dome on the signpost at the cross roads. KCC were not prepared to pay for a replacement. The Clerk had obtained an estimate of £1400 for making a replacement in cast iron. Councillors discussed alternative options and these will be followed up and the matter discussed at a future meeting.

**KCC Councillor Report** Richard Long reported that the KCC's £50 million invested in Iceland will shortly be returned. A Highways Application was being made in relation to the A26

**Planning Application** The council had no objection to the planning application for a first floor side extension at 23 Leney Road

**Public Discussion** Two items were raised:

- The parking of cars on KCC highways land at the junction of Tonbridge Road and Lodge Close
- The possibility of marking the Queen's Jubilee in 2012 in some way in the village, perhaps by planting of trees

**Next Meetings Tuesdays 6 December and 3 January** at 7.30pm in the village hall. Members of the public are most welcome to attend the meeting.

### OPEN AS USUAL

"Angels from the realms of glory", "O come all ye faithful", "Hark the herald" are well known, much loved carols of welcome. I look forward to greeting you all to our church this Christmas. There are a whole variety of services to come to and, whether it be a Nativity service, a carol service or Communion at Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, the doors will be "open as usual" and a warm welcome will await you. The hospitality of the church is fundamental to its life and, whilst we may get a few things wrong as a church, the welcome that we offer is at the very core of our being. As the vicar I am confident that we will do a great job this Christmas, and throughout the year, at offering you a warm welcome to the church. I firmly believe that we, the regular church goers, do not own the church. It is God's church and Jesus Christ is the host! So welcome to the church to which you all belong.

By the time you read this article I am sure that the St Paul's Cathedral issue will have been resolved in one way or the other. I certainly hope that its doors will be fully open and visitors and worshippers will be free to worship this Christmas in the usual fashion. However, I have no idea how the matter will be resolved but I have a feeling that it may well force the church to re-examine its role in a capitalist society and how it engages in the debates of the day. With whom should we align ourselves? It is so interesting to think that at Christmas time we reflect on the story of the birth of the Christ child but he was unwelcome in Bethlehem and the doors were closed and the birth took place in some kind of stable. Jesus then was born as some kind of outcast, he was disadvantaged from the very beginning. So began his life and ministry which showed us all how to care for the outcast and provide a world for all to live in and enjoy and not simply to protect the interests of a few privileged people. The best we can do, therefore, is to ask the question "What would Jesus do?"

Whilst I am loathe to pass judgement because I am not privy to all the facts, I fear that the closure of St Paul's Cathedral could prove to be a catastrophic mismanagement that may affect the whole of the church. I am acutely aware of the pressure that is brought to bear on those who have to make such decisions (I have personal experience of that myself, albeit in a minor way), it is simply not an easy one and so please remember them in your prayers. I am sure, as Canon Giles Fraser is (the Canon Chancellor of the Cathedral who resigned over the Cathedral's legal pursuance against the protestors), that Jesus would have protected the rights of the protesters and worshippers alike. That in my mind is a matter of social justice. The stable doors were open to welcome the Shepherds and later the Wise Men. Jesus then led a life of openness, of caring for the marginalised, of eating and walking alongside the outcasts. He reminds us how to love one another and how to be a neighbour towards one another and none of this was to do with our love for money or material wealth.

It is important, therefore, for me to be able to welcome you this Christmas to your church where you will find the doors "Open as usual" and where your host, Jesus Christ, abides in all that takes place within. So come, all you faithful, so that we might herald the birth of Jesus Christ together!
