WAR NEWS, SEPTEMBER 1914

6-9 September: Battle (often called the Miracle) of River Marne stems German advance into France.
14 September: on Eastern Front Russia driven from East Prussia following Battle of Tannenberg.
12-21 September: stalemate at Battle of Aisne on Western Front.
22 September: U9 sinks 3 British cruisers in North Sea off Dutch coast.
22 September-10 October: indecisive series of battles on Western Front
23 September: Japan joins Allies and declares war on Central Powers.
28 September: bombardment and siege of Antwerp starts.

normal population of the picking over a two or three Liaison with the railway timing the departure trains the village, unaffected as Sunday school, coffee stalls, hospital. The hospital had er of Wateringbury Place, -patients of whom 2, both

babies, died. The hop crop in 1914 was one of the best ever with both high volumes and good prices, so Wateringbury ended 1914 quite prosperous.

Britain did not have a conscripted army like other European countries, so much effort had to be put into raising an army of volunteers. Between August 1914 and January 1916 some 2 million British men volunteered. In September 1914 Parliament approved an increase in the size of the army, and in Wateringbury a recruiting meeting took place, organised by both main political parties chaired by Augustus Leney, the brewer. It resulted in 9 new volunteers to join the 57 Wateringbury men already serving in the armed forces but there was disappointment that the hoppers did not attend the meeting.

The war memorial in Wateringbury Church records 41 village men killed in the war, but the vicar felt that Wateringbury's first loss was Bert Potter, a stoker on H.M.S Aboukir. Bert is not on the memorial as he lived in Snodland, but was married to a girl from a Wateringbury family, the Woolgars. H.M.S. Aboukir was an obsolete cruiser, which had played a minor role in the first naval clash of the war, the Battle of Heligoland Bight at the end of August; it was patrolling in North Sea on 22 September with 2 other cruisers when all 3 were sunk by U-9 with the loss of nearly 1,500 lives.

SEPTEMBER PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

New Councillor Councillors voted in favour of co-opting Mrs Lin Simons who lives on Tonbridge Road. She then took her seat with Councillors and signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office

Police matters No crime report was received. The council is still awaiting for details of the parish's new Police Community Support Officer.

Village War Memorial A quote had been received for the refurbishing of the memorial. It is hoped that assistance can be obtained to help with the cost involved.

Street Lighting The council is contacting Kent Highways to establish if any legal agreement exists between the Parish Council and Kent highways. Possibilities for the 2 street lights in Old Road were discussed.

Wateringbury Sports & Recreational Association Council discussed the items raised by a recent ROSPA report on all the play equipment. It was agreed to pursue the recommendation that additional bark was needed to cover areas around some equipment where the textile covering was exposed.

Highways, JPCTCG & Speedwatch- Mr Charles Stroud stated more volunteers were needed for Speedwatch. Cllr Wells raised concern over the number of speeding vehicles along the A26 particularly near the junction with Pizien Well Road and the need for more speed enforcement measures. Cllr Wells also raised concerns about the overgrown vegetation along Old Road and at the junction of Pizien Well Road and the A26. This would be reported.

Allotments A party of plot holders have cleared the communal sheds at the allotments. All allotments are being worked at the moment.

Planning - Cllr Wells agreed to join the Planning Committee
Listed Building Application The Thatched House 1 Mill Lane : Alterations including removal of thatch on two bay windows to be replaced by reclaimed Kent peg tiles in keeping with the age of the extension. The Parish Council objects to this application as they considered the replacement material to be used is out of character with the rest of the building.

Public Discussion - Matters raised included:

The **footpath leading from Tonbridge Road to Allington Gardens** which had not been completely cleared. Some work had been done but then left and the path had since become overgrown again and vehicles were now parking on the footpath making it difficult for some pedestrians to get passed. These matters would be reported.

A large grey wheeled bin had appeared outside the tea room at the corner of Red Hill. Since this is in a Conservation area further investigations would be made.

The **next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7.30pm on Tuesday 7 October**. The council values the support of local residents who are welcome to come to the meeting and raise matters of concern.

I'm on holiday as I write this article for Rostrum and I'm doing things that I don't normally have the chance to do, such as reading a newspaper from front to back. In today's newspaper I read of the bumper wine harvest that we are about to experience here in the UK. The English vineyards have experienced near perfect weather conditions which will result in this harvest of grapes for wine. Not only will the industry be harvesting early this year, it is also expected to be of an excellent quality! In the same newspaper I read that 23% of us are really bothered by bees because they can sting us. It seems we enjoy the produce relating to a bumper harvest but we don't always enjoy some of the consequences. We need bees to pollinate the crops. One can't happen without the other. Most of us enjoy honey but it seems we don't like bees. It's simply mad, we just can't have it both ways. But we would like to if it was at all possible. We, therefore, have to learn to take the "rough with the smooth".

Our harvest is a gift from God. This year it seems that God has been more than generous. Farmers report excellent crops and we are up to a month early in harvesting. But there is always something which makes it less than perfect in our eyes. There is always some kind of cost or something to moan about. It could be we found some of the summer days too hot and we complained or perhaps we have moaned because we have been stuck behind a tractor in a country lane. It can't always be perfect! We have to take the "rough with the smooth".

Something else I manage to do lots of when I'm on holiday is to gaze. Gaze upon the beauty of creation through mountains, trees, rivers, wildlife and people etc. Harvest is not simply about what we fill our churches with at our harvest festivals. It is more to do with understanding and appreciating God's creative influence on our lives, including the bits we don't like. There is a plan and a purpose for everything that God creates. Bees need to be able to sting to protect themselves, for example.

I am thinking about God's plan for us all for this year's harvest time. With an abundance of produce I wonder if we might share more with our neighbours. Aid, in the form of food, is desperately needed in many parts of the world, for all number of reasons, as people continue to starve. I do hope our giving is increased for the benefit of the hungry. Equally, I hope we learn to accept the "rough with the smooth" when it comes to nature and God's continual gifts to us all. We have very little to complain about!
