STEP BACK IN TIME EASTER 1892 FROM THE PARISH MAGAZINE OF MAY 1892

The Easter of this year will long be remembered for the heavy fall of snow on Easter Eve, April 16th. In many places the snow lay 12 to 14 inches deep in the roads and made them impassable, causing a great disappointment to many who were not able to get to their Parish Church for their Easter Communion or Evening Service. It also prevented the Church being as fully decorated as usual with wild flowers. Notwithstanding there were sufficient flowers kindly sent by friends, especially Arum

Lilies, to make the Church look bright for the great Festival, and the services were well attended.

On Easter Monday the *Boys' Brigade* met for a Company Drill in the grounds of Wateringbury Place to which they were kindly invited by Col. and Mrs. Davies. After Drill the Company were entertained to a sumptuous Tea in the House, and were allowed to roam over the grounds and play games till dusk. The chief game was the un-Easter-like one of a snowballing match. A quantity of the parents and school children accompanied the lads to the grounds, and a very happy afternoon was spent, everybody being made heartily welcome by Col. and Mrs. Davies.

DIAMOND JUBILEE SNOWDROPS

In early March, thanks to the generosity of snowdrop supplier Sir John Wells of Mereworth, about 1250+ single and double snowdrops, instead of the ordered 1000, were planted around the village to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. They were planted on the Tonbridge Road at the entrance to the cemetery car park, the green at the junction with Canon Lane, the green close to the Festival Gardens by the traffic lights, and on both sides of the road at intervals to the village boundary close to The Orpines. In Bow Road they were planted at the entrance to the car park, the green by The Wardens track and in Phoenix Drive on the bank close to the side entrance to the school. The last planting area was in the vicinity of the Mill Pond at the end of Mill Lane. Thanks to the volunteers who helped with the planting. The bulbs will probably take a year or two to fully establish themselves but hopefully they will remind us all of the service and dedication of Queen Elizabeth II. They flower in the earliest part of the year when often life is a bit gloomy, they are often crushed by ice and snow, yet miraculously when the snow melts they are still there, their dainty flowers still bringing us joy. Unexpected harshness has not broken them.

HISTORY SOCIETY

Our April Speaker is Bronwen M Sadler who is coming to tell us about the Great Flood of 1953 of which she had personal experience and 'survived'. Bronwen's talk is illustrated and we are looking forward to being held spellbound (Bronwen's words) by the awfulness of it all. As well as giving talks and lectures, Bronwen is a very active member of the Kent History Federation, presently in the position of Hon. Secretary.

Sheila Boyd came along in February to tell us about Queen Victoria's Dreadful Uncles, the sons of King George III and Queen Charlotte. Victoria was the daughter of Edward, the fourth son, who became the Duke of Kent, and who died a year after Victoria was born. She was raised by her very protective mother, who shielded her from the scandals caused by the uncles, both at home and abroad. Sheila gave us an insight into the lives led by George, Frederick, William, Edward, Ernest, Augustus and Adolphus. Although King George III tried to ensure each of his sons lead a 'respectable' life, with the exception of Adolphus, they all failed and managed to get into very severe debt the equivalent of millions of pounds today. Unfortunately very few of the legitimate children born to these sons survived beyond childhood, apart from the two daughters born to Adolphus, Augusta and Mary, who later became the mother of Queen Mary. At least 56 illegitimate children are known to have been born from relationships formed by the 'Uncles'. Her talk was very interesting, informative and humorous, and she finished by saying that we have a lot to thank Queen Victoria for in giving us a pinnacle of respectable values. MARCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Cemetery – It was agreed to accept the estimate from Wildwood Tree Care to tidy up the trees in the cemetery.

February Crime Report The following crimes were reported

A holdall was stolen from an insecure vehicle parked in Old Road. A vehicle parked in the village hall car park had its door bent in order to gain entry. Nothing was stolen but £500 of damage was done to the door. The incident was captured on CCTV which will be used as evidence by the police. The theft of lead from the village hall roof. This was an ongoing issue nationwide due to the high scrap value.

The chairman reported that PCSO Dave Gilham will no longer cover the Wateringbury area. In future PCSO Philip Harrison will cover the village.

Playing Fields Mike Witts reported on the work at the playing fields to improve the ground. He also proposed that two areas around memorial trees at the fields should be planted with wildflowers to encourage insects and butterflies. The council supported this suggestion.

Council Land The question of access to the council's small piece of land close to Station House was discussed in some detail. KCC Councillor Richard Long offered to help the council find out the ownership of certain parcels of land in the vicinity of the council's land.

Highways Committee Charles Stroud agreed to represent the Parish Council at the next Highways meeting in Borough Green.

Borough Councillor Simon Jessel in reply to a question from the chairman said that discussions were still in progress about the T & M rates.

County Councillor Richard Long said that KCC were proposing to save £100 million so that there would not be an increase in rates bills.

He had asked the KCC's new highways manager to look again at the management of traffic on the A26. The proposal for a pedestrian crossing in the vicinity of the church had been rejected.

Planning The council had no objections to the renewal of the agreed planning permission relating to Abbeyfield Greensted in The Orpines.

This year, more so than most, I do feel that the Church needs to ensure that people are aware of the message of Easter, the great feast day in the Church calendar, in fact the most important day of the year for Christians throughout the world. I thought I might deviate from the usual format of my message and remind everyone of some simple facts about Easter. We often relate to Easter because of it providing a long week-end with two bank holidays and chocolate Easter eggs but perhaps we ought to think about it in more depth. Those who follow other faiths rarely need reminding of the facts behind their feast days! Here are some simple facts of the Christian faith in relation to Easter:

- a. Easter is the oldest and the most important Christian Festival, the celebration of the death and coming to life again of Jesus Christ. For Christians, the dawn of Easter Sunday, with its message of new life, is the high point of the Christian year.
- b. Easter is the story of Jesus' last days in Jerusalem before his death. The Easter story includes Maundy Thursday (the Last Supper leading to the Eucharist), Good Friday (the day on which Jesus was crucified) and Easter Day (the day on which Jesus came back to life).
- c. Pagan traditions give us the English word "Easter" which comes from the word "Eostre". The Anglo-Saxon word for April was "Eostre-monath" (the month of openings). However, it should be remembered that Christians celebrated the resurrection of Christ long before the word "Easter" was used, and the word they used for the celebration was "Pascha", which is derived from, and linked to, the Jewish festival of Passover.
- d. Easter is what we call a moveable feast because its date changes every year. The date of Easter is the first Sunday after the full moon following the northern hemisphere's Vernal Equinox. Ecclesiastically, the equinox is reckoned to be on March 21 (even though the equinox occurs, astronomically speaking, on March 20 in most years), and the "Full Moon" is not necessarily the astronomically correct date. The date of Easter therefore varies between March 22 and April 25.

Knowing the facts may be one thing but to experience the truth is often another. No human actually saw Jesus rise but human beings who knew the Lord Jesus did testify the tomb was vacated and they saw the Christ who arose in post resurrection appearances. We should declare that Christ has risen with all confidence and assurance in the validity of His rising. In a year when Christianity has been under the spotlight perhaps our Easter celebrations have become all the more important to celebrate. Come and join me! Revd Jim Brown
