PUBS OF WATERINGBURY

The Queen's Head, Tonbridge Road, now a private home – Nightingale House. It was probably built around 1860 next to the site of an earlier beer shop. It was purchased by local brewer John Beal Jude in May 1867. The pub closed its doors on 4 November 1977. It had many landlords including Mr Martin who was very well known. Mr and Mrs Bills were there from 1931-55 and they had a very busy time especially during hop-picking and it was also used a lot by the United States Air Force when they were at West Malling Airfield (now Kingshill). Many noisy parties took place and much fun was had. Next to the pub were two shops, a shoemakers and a butchers shop and these were demolished in the early 1930s. (information taken from Wateringbury as Remembered 1930-1980 by Charles Benfield, and About Wateringbury both available from the History Society).

SYLVIA GRACE CURD - 6 January 1916 - 22 December 2011

Sylvia was born in Wistaria Cottage on the Tonbridge Road where she lived until she made the hard decision to move to Greensted. She was finding life increasingly difficult even with the help of her dedicated carers. She adapted well in the home, the staff soon becoming her friends. Sadly after five weeks she got her wish and entered her heavenly home.

Sylvia always said she had many blessings during her life. Three special blessings were her brothers whom she adored. After her father sadly passed away in 1922 her eldest brother Leslie 20 took over her father's role, helped by Dick 18 and Howard 14.

Sylvia attended Wateringbury School where she was crowned May Queen. She went on to Tonbridge Grammar School and then to college for teacher training. Her first teaching post was 1937-1942 at Collier Street. In 1942 she moved to Mereworth where she became Deputy Head, and remained there until she retired in 1976. Old pupils still kept in contact with her.

William Curd, Sylvia's father, founded the Wateringbury company of The Boys' Brigade in the late 1800s and Sylvia followed in his footsteps being one of the founder members of the Wateringbury Guides.

She enjoyed travelling, visiting many different countries during school holidays. Soon after retiring Sylvia took a trip on Concorde. She had a wide circle of friends especially the elderly, visiting the sick and taking them gifts. Sylvia was devoted to her mother and cared for her Aunt Sylv (who also lived at Wistaria Cottage) for many years. Her mother became her great companion after losing her father and they often went on day trips together.

During her driving days Sylvia would often take her friends on little outings and have morning coffee or afternoon tea. She never forgot a birthday, often phoning her good wishes.

Sylvia was an active member of the Church. She befriended, and remained in contact with, each vicarage family, working tirelessly in her modest fashion to help them in their parish work and personally. For many years Sylvia said the Immortal Words on Remembrance Sunday and when she read the lesson during church services she learnt and rendered the passage with drama bringing the stories alive.

Sylvia thought the world of her five nieces: Margaret, her only goddaughter, Daphne, Audrey, Pamela and Brenda. Living locally Margaret and Daphne visited weekly to help her with her needs. Sylvia found it hard having to accept help not being able to thank us enough. We were only in some small way repaying her for the kindness she had given us over the years. This is only a short account of Sylvia's happy life. She would say "Don't be sad when I'm gone, remember me how I was I have lived a good life with no regrets." Margaret and Daphne

FEBRUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk, Redhill Cottage, Redhill or e-mail susan_jc@btinternet.com. Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which is held directly after the monthly parish council meeting in the village hall on the first Tuesday of each month.

At the start of the meeting it was announced that Kate Averill had resigned from the council. Vice-chair Maureen Allen therefore takes over the role of Chair until the May elections. Maureen thanked Kate for all her hard work for the village during her time on the council.

Kent Police reported that there were no reported crimes in the village last month.

The Fields Association and Wateringbury Cricket Club gave a joint presentation to the meeting on the activities carried out at the playing fields. John lbbs said that the association was a voluntary group whose role is to organise the hire of cricket and football pitches, monitor and upkeep pitches and the sports pavilion. Simple maintenance is funded from the hire fees.

Recently the pavilion had been upgraded, the main focus being the shower area. Grants had been obtained, most of the work being done by volunteers. The parish council had helped to fund the much needed improvements to the entire grass areas which had been decimated by settlement and rabbits. A rolling maintenance plan had been prepared. The committee were still in negotiation with the rail authorities over the steps needed to keep the rabbits, whose burrows are on the rail land, from entering the playing fields. Over the weekend of 8-10 April, in conjunction with the cricket club, there are plans to participate in the national Nat West Cricket Force initiative to enhance the facilities. The Treasurer, Richard Dickety, reported that the annual turnover was approximately £3000, mainly from hire of pitches. This was spent on maintenance of pitches, marking of pitches, electricity, water and cleaning. Pitch fees for out of village teams were more than village teams. Grants were successfully gained from various sporting bodies.

The Junior Football teams are thriving with 95 boys and girls registered and 9 teams playing regularly. More youngsters will be very welcome. All coaches are FA registered and qualified.

The Annual General Meeting will be held shortly; it is hoped that more members of the community will come along and support the work being done.

Mike Witts reported on the work of the village cricket club formed in 1985. Over the years the Cricket Club has contributed funds and an enormous amount of hard work into building the Pavilion which was opened in June 1992. The club has continually strived to improve the facilities. The Cricket Club spend approximately £1200-£1500 each year to maintain the cricket square, excluding the cost of hundreds of man hours which members spend to ensure the pitches are first class. An English Cricket Board Inspector took samples from the cricket square in November 2010. The results rated the pitches as good quality and the bounce rating was "County standard". A just reward for

all the hard work club members have done over the last 25 years. The cricket square is used by the village cricket club, church, village, school and visiting side Court Cavaliers for matches during the season.

Mike Witts has liaised with the school and last year ran Kwik Cricket classes on the cricket square during school time. This year he has been invited back to run an after-school cricket club and also to introduce cricket to the top years. The club will be taking possession of a mobile cricket practice net in March purchased with the help of grants obtained from KCC, Councillor Richard Long and the Lord's Taverners. The facility will be erected as part of the Workforce weekend on 8-10 April. Club members must continually work to improve the facilities in such a great setting, and not take them forgranted.

Borough Councillor Frances English reported that T & M are to receive 28% less funding from central government over the next 2 years. It is proposed that T & M and Gravesham will share a Chief Executive for 2 years, when the position will be reviewed.

The council agreed to install new gates and posts at the car park entrance of the cemetery.

Councillor Chris Talbert reported on the Kent Community Rail Partnership meeting held on 25 January. Planning permission was being sought for the installation at the station of the mural made by children from the school. Four more planters will be provided for the platforms.

New bus stops and timetables will be coming soon.

Councillor Bev Evans reported on the Highways and Transportation sub-committee meeting which had preceded the general meeting.

- * Speedwatch teams continue to operate within the village. On average the numbers of 20+ vehicles travelling at over 37 mph are passed to the police.
- * PCSO Dave Gillham is working with the school to develop a road sign to slow traffic in the school vicinity. Councillors voted to support the project financially with £70 to cover the production of the sign.
- * More salt monitor volunteers are needed to distribute road salt in their immediate neighbourhoods in icy weather. Thanks to all those who helped in December's snow.

At the Planning sub-committee, directly after the close of the general meeting. The council's comments on the following planning applications can be seen at T & M Offices, Kingshill:

- * Erection of agricultural poly tunnels covered with clear plastic sheeting to include rotational tunnels and successive tunnels with no more than 165 ha (30%) of the landholding covered with tunnels in any one calendar year. Additional information addendum Barons Place Farm Mereworth.
- * Listed Building Application new rear entrance canopy Wateringbury Place.
- * Proposed front entrance gates/piers, proposed patio/hard standing, retention of windows and velux rooflights of size and position on building as constructed alternate to those approved under permission TM/10/00044/FL at Woodlands Edge 59 Teston Road.

The next meeting of the council is on Tuesday 1 March at 7.30 in the village hall

Firstly an apology; thank you to those who pointed out that last month I referred to the Jet Stream as going from East to West. This was a senior moment, it does, of course, go from West to East. After the trauma of November and December, January and February reverted to the warm and damp weather I had expected. The Jet Stream is still messing about so let's hope it settles down soon.

January was rather wet with 96.5mm (3.8") of rain, a good 30mm above average. The average minimum temperature was 3.76°C (38.77°F) and the average maximum 7.36 °C (45.25°F) against norms of 2.4°C and 7. The first half of February was slightly low on rainfall with well above average temperatures. So far this year the air temperature has dropped below zero °C on only 2 occasions with ground frost about 8 times. WWW

ABOUT YOUR PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Councils are the first tier of local Government and as such come under a Code of Conduct the same as Central Government. A Parish Council may also have a set of Standing Orders.

A Parish Council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of the local community. They represent the local community, deliver services to meet local needs and strive to improve quality of life in the parish. Wateringbury Parish Council is responsible for the maintenance of the allotments, the cemetery, playing fields, bus shelters, some street lighting and some village signs. They work with the local Borough Council and Kent Highways by reporting issues that need attention but are outside their remit. Amongst their powers they can contribute financially to crime prevention and traffic calming measures. The Council works closely with the Borough and Kent County Council elected Councillors and the police.

How do they raise the money to provide these services? Each year a sum of money call the 'precept' is collected through your council tax. This amount is determined each year at an open meeting to form the budget for the following financial year. Wateringbury Parish Council may have a maximum of 9 Councillors. Each member is unpaid and is summoned to attend 11 meetings a year held on the first Tuesday of each month in the village hall. There are two part-time employees of the Council; they are the Clerk and the Village Warden. Meetings are well attended by the public who can raise issues with the Council during public discussion time at a meeting.

There is a Highways & Transportation Committee and a Planning Committee, both of which are open meetings held on the same evening as a Parish Council meeting. Some Councillors represent the Council on outside bodies.

If you are over 18, a British subject or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union and an elector, you qualify to be a Parish Councillor if you have lived in the parish, or within 3 miles of it, for longer than twelve months, are owner or tenant of land or premises or it is your principal or only place of work. If being a part of the 'team' interests you there are Parish Council elections this May and you should obtain Nomination Papers as soon as possible by calling Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council on 01732 844522 Electoral Services. Completed papers must be with Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council between 10.00am and 4.00pm from Tuesday 29th March 2011 and the close which is noon on Monday 4thApril 2011. We have just managed to survive a thoroughly cold winter and we are now watching the weather shift in to "Spring" mode over the next few weeks. I was disappointed to learn that the Met Office were giving up on long range 'headline' forecasting after predicting a barbeque summer in 2009 and a mild winter in 2010. It's true that as a nation we're obsessed with the weather. Someone rightly commented that we complain if we have any kind of the same weather for more than two weeks regardless of what it is! With that in mind I share this story with you -I hope you enjoy it!

The Blackfeet tribe of Indians asked their Chief in autumn if the winter was going to be cold or not. Not really knowing the answer, the Chief replies that the winter was going to be cold and that the members of the village were to collect wood to be prepared.
