PUBS OF WATERINGBURY - The Harrow, Old Road

The pub was closed and de-licensed in 1968 and became a private house, although the wrought-iron bracket for the old pub sign is still in place. Until the A26 was built Old Road was the main thoroughfare. (The new road (A26) separated the gatehouses of Mereworth castle from main building). The property was built in the late 1600s and for much of its life was an ale house, it was granted a wine licence in 1947 and a full licence in 1958. After the A26 was built the pub's main clients were agricultural workers from surrounding farms and, of course, hop pickers at hopping time. In 1876 the brewing Leney Brothers bought the beerhouse, with a fishmongers and 3 adjoining cottages for £1150. In 1954 the licencees were Mr and Mrs Martin. (*Information taken from Whitbread the Inn behind the Signs by David Harper*)

MAY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk Redhill Cottage, Redhill or e-mail Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which is held directly after the monthly parish council meeting in the village hall on the first Tuesday of each month..

The May meeting was the first for the new 5 year term. It was disappointing that only 4 people, all existing councillors, formally put their names forward to serve the community as Parish Councillors. These were Maureen Allen, Michael Cayzer, Richard Tripp and Denis Stones.

At the start of the meeting Doug Chivers, Bev Evans and Chris Talbert were co-opted on to the council. One other parishioner has expressed an interest in joining the council. This leaves 2 vacancies. It is hoped that quite soon these vacancies can be filled. If you would like to know more about joining the council, please contact Sue Cockburn, the Parish Clerk on 01622 817068.

Michael Cayzer was elected as chairman and Richard Tripp as vice chairman.

The previous chairman Maureen Allen has moved from the village and is therefore unable to continue to serve as a parish councillor. She formally tendered her resignation and the new chairman expressed his thanks to her for all her hard work and commitment during her time as a parish councillor.

Councillors deferred the decisions re membership of sub-committees until the June meeting when it was hoped there would be a full complement of councillors.

It was agreed to look further into the QE2 Fields Challenge 2012 and to obtain quotes for rabbit proof fencing at the playing fields.

Since part of the Pear Orchard land is leased from the Parish Council the appointment of new contractors to manage the Orchard from February 2012 was formally agreed. The new contractor will be Chris Phillips of Hunton.

The newly elected Tonbridge and Malling Borough Councillor, Simon Jessel, was unable to attend the meeting as he was being formally inducted into his post at the Borough Council offices.

Directly following the meeting the planning committee met and considered the following planning applications, to which they had no objections:

- Single storey side extension to existing dwelling at 22 Mill Lane
- Full planning permission for change of use of existing building from class B1 offices to 3 residential units at 170 Tonbridge Road. This was a revised plan, there would be 3 parking spaces per dwelling and outline planning for a detached dwelling is no longer sought.

An e-mail from Marion Regan of Hugh Lowe Farms to a former chairman of the council was made public. Anyone wishing to read the contents should contact the parish clerk.

The council appreciate the support of parishioners and hope that more will be able to attend its meetings. The next meeting will be in the village hall at 7.30pm on Tuesday 7 June.

INSTALLING HUSBAND – a new wife writes to IT technical support

HISTORY SOCIETY

Our June meeting will commence with a short Annual General Meeting, which will include the election of a new Chairman, followed by a talk from Peter Harley on “Princes and Palaces”. Peter is returning to tell us more about his experiences whilst in Service with the Royal Family, and he will also be speaking about past monarchs and their residences, starting with Queen Victoria through to the present day.

Andrew Clarke came along in April to show us, through slides, and to tell us how Maidstone has been affected by Fires since the 1700s. In 1730 the spire of All Saints Church was struck by lightning and totally destroyed by the resulting fire; this led to one of the first fire fighting appliances for Maidstone being installed in the West end of the Church – a box for the storage of water and a hose.

Gradually the equipment used was improved but was privately owned and although supplied with a wagon with a water pump, the firemen had to hire horses from the local “Hackney Carriages” in order to reach the fire. A plaque, issued by insurance companies was given to policy holders, to be displayed on the outside of their premises, to show they were entitled to receive the services of the firemen. During and after WWI the fire services were improved, and the uniform worn by firemen remained the same for many years, except for the steel helmet which when in contact with trailing electrical wires proved to be an extra hazard.

We were shown photographs taken of many major fires experienced in Maidstone, including the serious fire at Oakwood Hospital in 1957 when the water tower collapsed killing and injuring several people, including firemen. Many businesses and cinemas in the town were demolished by fires, one of the most recent being Andrew’s furniture store in King Street.

DEATH OF BIN LADEN

It has been an amazing Spring; record temperatures, no rain, Bank Holidays, a Royal Wedding, local elections, the referendum on AV and, of course, the death of Bin Laden. There is so much for me to comment on that I hardly know where to begin.

The church should be engaging in the issues of the day and I feel that the death of Osama Bin Laden must not pass by without a mention as the world discusses the legitimacy of such action by the US. It could be said that armchair critics, such as me, have no right to comment about the rights and wrongs of the execution of Bin Laden because I have not lost a loved one in the awful attacks on New York and London and other places around the world. I understand that argument and I do not seek to diminish the sense of relief at the closure of such an unpleasant bit of unfinished business. It is right for Bin Laden to be brought to justice and my sympathies are firstly with those victims and their families. However, whilst we wait for more facts to be disclosed (and we must not forget that we do not know all the facts, and indeed they may never all be made public), I do have concerns. Let me put it simply, if the UK had discovered a convicted IRA murderer being sheltered in Boston, USA, and sent the SAS to execute him without the US government knowing I suspect there would be questions asked. To embark upon a process of execution without some kind of effort to implement the due process of law and human rights could be deemed a dangerous path to follow. I do believe that the US are in real danger of believing that they are the world's policeman and that can't be right although were they to have taken Bin Laden back to the US to stand trial that would have created innumerable security problems. There has been a call for some kind of International Court of Justice to whom the world could look for proper policing and justice and maybe it is time for such consideration.

I was also concerned at the jubilation at the death of another human being, especially in the US. I do not rejoice in anyone's death, whether they are my friend or enemy (and I have met with both). We must always act in a civilised fashion, and our actions should not become as barbaric as those who perpetrate these awful crimes in the first place. I'm sure many readers will share differing views and I hope that my comments do not offend anyone. I have always considered myself, throughout my life, as being a hardliner when dealing with offenders but I passionately believe in working within the rules of law.

Meanwhile, the Church has a message to offer the debate and it speaks of love of enemies, prayer for persecutors and forgiveness of sins. Not easy! But there is an omission in my little list of Springtime events which appeared at the start of this article which should have included Easter. It is the Easter message that we, as Christians, should live by. Jesus was executed unlawfully and yet his remarkable response was so civilised that he changed the world in the process.
