**SAFE AND SENSIBLE STREET LIGHTING - PART-NIGHT LIGHTING** Kent County Council are progressing the implementation of its Safe and Sensible Street Light policy to reduce the annual energy bill, carbon emissions and light pollution. Already 70,000 street lights have been converted in Tunbridge Wells and Sevenoaks and details of street lights to be converted to part-night in Tonbridge & Malling have been posted on their website at [www.kent.gov.uk/streetlights](http://www.kent.gov.uk/streetlights) with a link to their interactive mapping tool which allows users to find out which street lights are affected on a post code search. The Parish Council were asked by KCC if they would like any of the lights owned by the parish, that weren't already part-night, to be converted at the same time. The Parish Council have decided not to accept this offer.

### **PLAYING FIELD REPAIRS**

Many of you will have noticed that a large area, west of the cricket square, at the Playing Fields has been fenced off over the last few months by orange plastic fencing. This was needed as the area was becoming extremely dangerous. Ankle braking holes and scrapes caused by rabbits were making the field a serious risk to safety. The area was levelled, top soiled and re-seeded. The barrier fence was erected to protect the area and allow for settlement and good growth. However, with the bad weather the barrier has had to stay in place a little longer because the ground is still very soft. To stop rabbits, pets and humans getting on to the area we have now arranged the barrier in such a way that there is no access around the edge. This will allow the ground to dry out in this excellent spell of dry weather we are enjoying and allow the edges of the field that have been used by dog walkers etc to dry out and regenerate. We hope that we will be able to take the fencing down within the next few weeks Please be patient. Continuing to use the area and the edge of the field will only slow down recovery and walking on the repaired area can potentially ruin the work that has been carried out. ### **MARCH PARISH COUNCIL REPORT**

**Cemetery** steps were being taken to remove branches which had fallen from boundary trees in the recent gales.

**Drayhorse Meadow** the tenant has now taken up occupancy.

**KCC Councillor Mathew Balfour** reported on matters of local interest. He had attended Wateringbury Primary School following his financial support of the school's new sports kit. Mathew informed the meeting he was most impressed with the school, its children and staff. His member's grant which enables him to contribute to local projects was being reduced considerably in the next financial year. KCC was increasing council tax by 1.9% for the coming year.

**Planning** Provided T & M's Conservation and Tree Officers approve the plans the Parish Council had no objections to the Demolition of existing brick garage and replacement with timber double garage at The White Cottage 171 Tonbridge Road.

**Speed Watch- February** As was the case in January, bad weather again adversely affected the planned programme. However during the month the team recorded 101 observations of vehicles passing through at speeds at or above 35mph and the relevant information was passed to Kent Police. When added to Kent Police's County data base for Speed Watch they identified that 19 vehicles had previously been observed speeding in various parts of the county of which 9 had offended for a second time, 1 for a third time, 1 for a fourth time and 2 for a fifth time. Also 2 vehicles were travelling at excessive speeds ie at 45 mph or above in a 30mph limit restriction. One of these two vehicles was clocked at 61mph on Red Hill. Appropriate warning letters were sent by the Police to the registered owners of the vehicles concerned accompanied by Speed Awareness advice. Although the Police do not divulge information as to when and where previous observations are made in respect of repeat offences.

**Sports and Recreation Association** After discussions the Council voted unanimously to accept a quote, with a 25 year guarantee, to fence the children's play area. The area reseeded recently has been fenced off to allow the grass time to establish. The areas chosen for planting Meadow Flowers will be prepared in the near future. All the main field and the new car park area will be rolled to help level the ground. Plans were progressing well for the Fields In Trust Village Celebration Fete on 1 June.

#### **WATERINGBURY IN APRIL 1914**

From the pages of the parish magazine

The Wateringbury Scouts recently gave a most creditable and amusing representation of "Jack and the Beanstalk". A good room full of people showed that the Scouts movement is appreciated – as indeed it ought to be, for it is an excellent organisation, the best of modern schemes to help lads to develop ideas of intelligence, self reliance, unselfishness, chivalry, patriotism – and what not? Mr Smith appealed to parents to encourage their boys to become scouts, announced the unsolicited gift of £1 to the troop from a kind donor, explained that Scouts were not allowed to ask for subscriptions, and said that the entertainment had been got up entirely by the boys themselves. *(The Wateringbury Scouts were founded in May 1909, one of the first in the country so the Movement's activities and ethics were not too well known).*

The School Accounts for the previous year were published in the April Church Magazine and showed expenditure over and above Contract of £258. 9s. 1d. for alterations – new flooring, windows, warming and cleaning Church Rooms and hire of Institute (*Church Rooms were on the Village Hall site and Institute is the Working Men's Club*) for use as schools during the alterations, enlarging playground and repairs and painting. The major donors to meet these costs were Mr A Leney £50, Mr R H Fremlin £100, Mr W Jude £25 (*all had breweries in the village*) and £10 each from Mr Alan Lambert, Mr Edward Goodwin and the Vicar. This left £52.19s.1d. outstanding. To help reduce the debt. Miss Hinton (*head of the girls' school*) and her assistants organised an entertainment by the girls' school in the Church Rooms which raised £7.8s. *(The village school was in Red Hill and the Boys and Girls were educated separately although on the same site. They catered for children from 5-14 when most started work. There was the equivalent of the 11+ exam and a few went to*

*Grammar schools usually in Maidstone)*

*The average weekly wage for a Farm Labourer in England and Wales in 1914 was between 14s and £1.2s.*
