

MARCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk, Redhill Cottage, Redhill. Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which follows the monthly general meeting

It was announced that the Mayor of Tonbridge and Malling Council is coming to perform the opening ceremony of the Village Celebrations on Sunday 2 June for the granting of QE2 status to the Playing Fields.

Drayhorse Meadow There was a lengthy discussion about the merits of creating additional parking for the Playing Fields on a small area of the meadow for use up to 80 times a year. Estimates have been obtained for fencing and creation of hard standing at this location. However Vice Chairman Richard Tripp felt that the council should explore and cost out the provision of a smaller number of parking spaces within the Playing Fields and proposed 2 possible sites. Councillors voted in favour of drawing down £10,000 from the agreed loan funds to bring the electrics at the Meadow stables up to the required standard and to repair and upgrade the track down to the fields. This work is necessary to prepare the area for livery letting.

CCTV Upgrade Councillors unanimously voted to upgrade the CCTV coverage and quality in the village car park at a cost of £145.

Footpath Upgrade Councillors were pleased to learn that there were funds available this year to upgrade the footpath from Teston Bridge to Bow Bridge. It was hoped that in future years the path between Bow Bridge and Nettlestead could be improved.

Borough Councillor Simon Jessel was at the meeting and he agreed to support the council in its efforts to gain approval to sub-let Drayhorse Meadow stabling, to gain approval to use a small area of the land for over-flow car parking and in the long-standing battle to have the pollution levels at the traffic lights reduced.

February Crime Figures One theft in Fields Lane area one incident of theft and a vehicle theft recorded in Glebe Meadow area. Two incidents of assault at the Retreat Caravan Park Silve Birch Walk. Incidents of anti social behaviour were at a minimum and there were no arrests.

Allotments The invoices for this year's rents have been sent out.

HISTORY SOCIETY

Our speaker in April is Mariana McCullen who works at Leeds Castle as a guide. She is coming along to tell us about the Medieval Queens associated with the castle which will possibly include one or two scandals.

Albert Granville came along in February to talk to us about his personal experiences in the operation of 'Raising the Mary Rose' from her watery grave. His talk commenced with the building of the Mary Rose, and her successful voyages before she became King Henry Eighth's flag ship in his Navy and her fateful last short voyage. Albert told us his company, which was involved in erecting oil rigs, was commissioned by Prince Charles because they had a floating crane, suitable for lifting the Mary Rose from her bed of mud in the Solent. Divers had been investigating the wreck for a number of years and had recovered many artefacts, including cannons, which are to be displayed in the museum presently being built in Portsmouth beside the building housing the remains of the Mary Rose which are still being kept moist 24 hours a day.

Albert reminded us of the monumental day, viewed on television, probably by all of us in the audience, when the crane was placed over the wreck and proceeded to lift it to the surface, whereupon it slipped to one side, a heart stopping moment for all concerned. Albert's very interesting and at times amusing talk had not only covered the history of the Mary Rose but what had happened since she was raised from the Solent, and the plans for her future.

"HE IS NOT HERE, FOR HE IS RISEN".

Last year I was privileged to have had the chance to travel to the Holy Land on two occasions, once in January and then again in September. I had also been twice before (I am so fortunate). On each occasion I stayed in Jerusalem and visited The Garden Tomb. This is an alternative site to the place where Jesus was believed to have been buried and where he rose from the tomb. (The traditional site being the church of the Holy Sepulchre, now within the walls of the Old City). 2,000 years ago a rocky outcrop by a busy thoroughfare skirting the city of Jerusalem was a good place for a burial chamber. Many believe this may have been the site of the tomb which Joseph of Arimathea gave for Christ's burial after the crucifixion. Today the site is a beautiful and peaceful garden and the empty tomb is a reminder of a risen, living Saviour in a harsh, often uncaring, world.

On the door to the tomb itself are the words "He is not here, for he is risen". It was in a place like this (because we do not know for sure whether it was here or not) that Mary Magdalene, distraught with grief and despair, mistook the risen Jesus for the gardener. She recognised him when he called her by name. It is so amazing to think that Jesus appeared firstly to a woman who was also believed to be a sinner. This is a powerful statement, because it identifies Jesus as someone who really did die for our sins.

What relevance is this for us today. The Garden Tomb is a very pleasant garden oasis in the middle of a typical Middle Eastern City. You can get carried away with the tranquillity of the place. But did it happen there? Was this where Jesus rose from the dead? The truth is that no one knows and I want to suggest that it simply does not matter. The notice on the door to the tomb is what matters "He is not here, for he is risen".

By now Easter has been celebrated and I hope the message you have received is a simple message that "He is not here, for he is risen". It tells why a death by cruel torture that took place nearly 2,000 years ago has and will have a lasting effect on the relationship between human beings and God. Jesus literally died for us - in our place he accepted the anger and the punishment of God for our sin. If you believe this then you can know the risen Lord in a living and personal way. That is the Easter message of the empty tombAlleluia!
