John Benjamin was born in Burham and spent much of his life working and living in the Medway Towns. He moved to The Brucks when he retired in 1983 and enjoyed his retirement with his wife Betty. He was a quiet gentleman who loved travelling, gardening and his family.

Freda Gwendoline Robbins Freda was a long time resident of the village and sadly passed away on 30 October. A Salisbury lass, Freda was a nurse working in Bath when, in 1944, one of her patients was a young soldier who had sustained shrapnel in his leg, (he wore a caliper for the rest of his life). Love blossomed and in June 1947

she and Doug were married and came to live in his family home in Bow Road. She took an active part in village life; with Cath (Bennett) Perryman she restarted the Brownies and they ran the pack until the arrival of Freda's first son, Mark. She also helped organise the Seniors Club. An enthusiastic member of the W.I. Freda served for many years as Treasurer, and then as President. She was famed for the delicious cakes she baked for the enjoyment of members at the monthly meetings. She broke her hip after a fall, and then the other hip and an elbow, and over the past year life was not easy for her. JOHN CULLINGWORTH – A TRIBUTE

John was my predecessor when I arrived at Watringbury C.E. Primary School in September of 1982. At that time John had gained promotion to a larger Deputy Headship in the Maidstone area. Our school was not doing very well, and many people were very sad at his going. Once in the job, I quickly realized that John was a very difficult act to follow. He had charisma, style and a measure of unique eccentricity necessary when leading a school. On top of this he was a brilliant musician, writing musicals for the school and developing those artistic skills in his pupils.

He was very helpful to me personally as I settled into the school, and for the rest of our teaching careers our paths ran parallel and often crossed. John was a keen cricketer, and in those early eighties he and others like Mike Witts and Godfrey Featherstone tried to start a Watringbury Cricket Club. I was roped in, but those early games coincided with a very wet summer, and it just didn't work out at that time. I do remember John, wicket keeping, waving his gloved arms, his "basso profundo" voice commanding those in the outfield to return the ball quickly, not exactly using those words!

When Miss Thompson retired from the School in 1988, the post of Headteacher was vacant. John and I both applied; we were both "short-listed", and we were both given an interview. We were both amused by the problem this gave Mrs. Blest, the then Chair of Governors, and our Vicar, the Reverend Donald Bish. The interview process lasted for three days, and we were friends before, during and after the whole process. John soon gained his own Headship at Wouldham All Saints C.E. School, which was a just reward for all his talents. Knowing my love of History, John invited me to attend his School's Trafalgar celebrations each year. His welcome was always the same – he was busy, but not too busy, and would always give me a job to do as he buzzed around setting up and organising the Day.

John was always on the go; full of plans; he always had things to do. He had vision and the energy to put things in motion. Sometimes frustrated by circumstance, he never let it get him down for too long. He was generous and encouraging to me as a colleague, and was always keenly interested in Watringbury, not just the School but the whole community. To John, Watringbury was a special place of which he always spoke fondly. His former pupils and their parents always spoke, and speak, with fondness of John. He will be missed, of course, but more importantly, John Cullingworth will be affectionately remembered. Richard Arnold

NOVEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk, Redhill Cottage, Redhill. Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which follows the monthly general meeting

Allotments Councillors will shortly be carrying out an inspection of the plots to ensure all plots are being worked efficiently and maintained to the appropriate standard. There are 3 people on the waiting list.

Cemetery The recent high winds had damaged a fir tree. A special area for Children's graves and ashes is to be considered and a site meeting will be held.

October Crime figures The chairman read out the Police Monthly Update. The crimes of note were 1 burglary of scrap items stolen from a garden shed, 1 criminal damage when a fence was broken, 1 theft from a motor vehicle in Cobbs Close when tools were taken from an unsecure vehicle, 1 drug offence on Tonbridge Road when a formal warning was given. There are ongoing investigations relating to 1 robbery when a male stole money from the till at the service station. Two incidents of anti-social behaviour occurred - guests were removed from the premises of a local pub and fly tipping in Park Road. PCSO Philip Harrison has moved to a new area and PCSO Lia Bishop will be looking after the village area over the coming months as well as East Malling.

Rail Partnership Councillor Chris Talbert reported on a recent meeting of the Kent Community Rail Partnership he had attended. Some stations on the Medway Valley line will require to be modified to meet the requirements for Disabled Access by 2020.

Signal Box Councillor David Marks agreed to contact British Rail on the Council's behalf to find out what the plans were for the box when the automatic level crossing barriers are installed.

Sports and Recreation Association Councillors arranged to meet at the play area to help spread the safety chippings which were to be delivered in the near future. Mike Witts reported that when he had been working at the fields he had been approached on several occasions by parents requesting that the play area be fenced to keep dogs away from children and equipment. Councillors agreed to investigate the proposal.

Speedwatch In October 139 vehicles (the same number as last month) were observed travelling at excess speed through the village, for some offenders this was the second or third time they had been logged.

Planning The planning committee met at the close of the general meeting. They supported the General Council's application for change of use to utilise 1000 sq metres of land previously used for grazing for provision of an overflow car park to adjacent sports pavilion existing car park at Drayhorse Meadow: and had no objections to plans to convert garage into study and utility area, replacing door with brickwork and window at 22 Waterside Mews.

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be on **Tuesdays 3 December and 7 January at 7.30pm** in the village hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend the meetings.

A DAY OUT WITH THE WATERINGBURY BELLRINGERS

The day dawned bright and sunny, perfect for our annual outing. This is a chance for us to visit other towers and experience ringing on unfamiliar bells. Ex-Wateringbury ringers travelled from the Isle of Wight and West Sussex to join us for the day. We had a very enjoyable day visiting a total of five churches, starting at Sundridge (6), moving on to Brasted (8), Downe (6), Hayes (6) and finishing at Chelsfield (8). At Wateringbury we only have 6 bells but Brasted and Chelsfield which are 8-bell towers were a challenge for us to ring because of the extra bells. The anti-clockwise ring at Brasted proved additionally problematic for some of us as the temptation was to face the wrong direction when ringing commenced. During the day the ringing ranged from call changes and plain hunt to the more complicated methods of Grandsire Doubles, Plain Bob Minor, and London Surprise Minor. Lunch was in the Queens Head in Downe which fortified us for the afternoon's ringing at Hayes and Chelsfield. Some of us ended the day with a meal at the Scared Crow in West Malling and an opportunity to discuss the day's ringing. Thank you to Dave and Fran for organising the day (including the fair weather). Our plan is to visit towers in London for next year's outing.

HISTORY SOCIETY

In October our speaker was Bob Appleton whose talk was entitled "Round Britain by Tram". His talk showed the development of tramways in Britain from over 100 years ago as illustrated on old picture postcards of the period. New electric tramways and the picture postcard craze coincided in the early years of the 20th century and we were

transported back to that time with Bob's slides and then on to the present day. We were shown how the trams differed between counties and up and down the country from Scotland to Cornwall. Initially horse-drawn, even powered by steam complete with a boiler room and a stoker for the fire, and also by electricity. Several members of the audience could remember travelling in trams and Bob mentioned that trams were still running in Manchester, Blackpool and on the Isle of Man, as well as abroad. When the tramlines were taken up, some were replaced with trolley buses run on overhead electric lines, and many of us could remember them running from Barming through Maidstone and on to Loose. We experienced another trip down memory lane with Bob's talk.

LAMENT FOR A LOST ORCHARD

There is an orchard that lies between Old Road and Gibbs Hill that has not been cultivated for 6 years. At first I felt a sad to see the trees neglected, but after a while I began to see the space as an amazing nature reserve. Green woodpeckers are plentiful, rooting for insects; a pair of kestrels nest in the trees hunting mice and voles over the orchards. Buzzards have moved in to the area and on sunny days they ride the thermals and their high pitched mew can be heard for miles.

In spring the trees still produce a show of blossom and in early summer the red and black cinnabar moths arrive and lay their eggs on the ragwort. The stripy caterpillars devour the plants and grow fat. The ragwort has almost disappeared as the caterpillars have increased in number.

As summer progresses there is a tapestry of colours on the field below the orchard made up of thistles and different species of grass in flower. Butterflies, bees and hover flies enjoy the nectar and pollen. On sunny Autumn days olive grass snakes bask in the warmth. A family of weasels lives among the rocks. As autumn turns to winter the orchard is filled with the chatter of field fares who rely on the fruit to see them through the cold period. This summer I found a small number of the truly astonishing bee orchid. The flower mimics both the appearance and smell of a female bee and attracts male bees to achieve pollination.

In the past few days the entire space has changed. The trees have been ripped out, still laden with fruit that lies smashed and pressed in to the mud. I understand the increasing need for the land to provide food. However, I truly regret the loss of the habitat and I wonder if we will all, in the end, regret the loss of biodiversity. MAKE 2014 THE YEAR YOU EXPAND YOUR HORIZONS AND VOLUNTEER TO ENHANCE THE COMMUNITY

Our village is fortunate to have many organisations which give enjoyment to members, help others and generally make life better for local people. Below are a few who could do with more volunteers – it's an eclectic selection, something to suit all ages and talents. You'll meet different people, use and develop your skills and you'll probably enjoy yourself too!

Parish Council Become a Parish Councillor – there are 2 vacancies. Ideally Councillors will live in various parts of the village so that when discussing any topic councillors will be able to put forward the concerns and aspirations of their neighbours. However, you can still apply if you live within a 3 mile radius of the village or own property or have business connections in the village. At the moment none of the councillors live in the Western area of the village, ie from the traffic lights to Pizien Well so if you live in these areas please do volunteer, but, of course, volunteers are welcome from any part of the village. Our Parish council work to improve the village environment. Councillors meet on the first Tuesday of each month for a formal, decision making meeting. In between times members are on other committees ie planning, allotments, cemeteries, transport, etc and represent the village's interests on various committees in the Borough and County. They also help practically from time to time ie in times of bad weather, with the general tidying up of the village, etc.

Rainbows We are looking for new volunteers to run the Rainbows! The unit is in need of new leaders to take over from Carolyn Peal and Karen Shute in the Spring/Summer of 2014. Volunteering within Girl Guiding is fun, interesting, a great way to get to know people and most of all very rewarding. Speedwatch To become a speedwatch volunteer you don't have to commit to a set time each week or month. Our local organizer arranges Speedwatch sessions to suit the availability of individuals. Groups of 3 people spend 1-2 hour sessions at points in the village envelope which have been agreed with the police; they note down, and pass on to the police, the registration numbers of vehicles travelling above the speed limit. Statistics show that the faster a vehicle is travelling the greater the injuries or chance of death if an accident occurs. AN INVITATION TO PUT CHRIST BACK IN TO CHRISTMAS

For many people a Christmas crib is an important part of their celebrations. In a replica stable, shepherds, wise men and proud parents gather round a small child lying in a manger: this is how we imagine the tableau. But the reality was probably rather different. We know from Luke 2:8 that there was no room at the inn and Christ was laid in a manger (a drinking trough for animals), but that's it. However, in the centre of Bethlehem is The Church of the Nativity, built around 330AD by the emperor Constantine. It's thought to be the oldest church in existence and I have been privileged to have visited it on quite a few occasions. Beneath the church, in the grotto, is the birthplace itself. It seems quite surreal that this could be the very spot of Christ's birth. The very place where Christmas began. Sadly there are fewer Christians living in Bethlehem every year. It's almost as if Christ is being ignored in his actual place of birth.

But Christmas can mean other things for people. Christmas can be a time of parties, presents and turkey. It can be a time of Christmas trees, fairy lights and tinsel. It may have nothing to do with Christ. What does Christmas mean to you? What does Christmas mean to me? Well it may start with an Advent candle and then setting up a crib in the weeks before Christmas. But for my family and me, Christmas starts with Midnight Communion when we can really celebrate the birth of Jesus. I actually love to attend Church later on Christmas morning.

In Bethlehem, where there are fewer Christians, Christ will always remain a part of Christmas. In the world beyond there are many millions of Christians but, ironically, it seems Christ is being taken out of Christmas. It would be wonderful if we could put the CHRIST back into CHRISTMAS perhaps by filling our Church, your Church, by attending one of the special services over the Christmas period. The circulation of this magazine reaches over 2,000 residents so there should be enough people reading this to fill St John's many times over. It would be wonderful to see YOU in Church, putting the CHRIST back into CHRISTMAS as if we really were in Bethlehem ourselves.
