On the 4 July 2012 WSRA received a grant from our then County Councillor Richard Long, to allow them to purchase wild meadow flower seeds and sow them in two areas down at the main playing field. The first seeds were sown during our "Work Force" weekend of the 6 and 7 April and the remainder during the afternoon of the 15 May. The flower mix we sowed this year for colour balance and succession of display contained :- Shirley Poppy, Californian Poppy, Cornflower, Fairy Toadflax, Red Flax, Bishop's Flower, Tickseed and Corn Marigold, Black Eyed Susan, Red Orache and Larkspur. THE WATERINGBURY SIGNAL BOX

A major feature of the village is the unique 'tudorbethan' rail station and level crossing near the River, at the bottom of Bow Road. Generations of small children have been taken to see the level crossing gates being operated by the attendant descending from the Signal Box to open or close the gates both before and after a train has passed. Sadly, this Box will become redundant in the next few months as Network Rail installs a modern new signalling system to control both the signals and the gates.

The Signal Box is a Saxby and Farmer type 12, which has been in continuous use at Wateringbury since it was first installed in 1893. It was listed Grade II by the Maidstone Borough Council under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 in July of this year under reference 1414978. As this listing includes both the racks and brass handled signalling levers, it will be hard to find an alternative use for the Box which is acceptable both to Network Rail, and to the Planning Authority, but it would be a great shame if the Box were to be removed from its present position, if for instance, it were to be acquired by a Railway Museum. An alternative possibility might be for the Box to be purchased by either the Borough Council or by the Parish Council. One possible use might be of storage for the village archives which have been collected by the Wateringbury Local History Society over the years.

The railway was first connected to Wateringbury in 1844, with a single track line from Paddock Wood, station, then known as: Maidstone Road. It was later dualled, and extended first to Maidstone West station, and then to Strood. The line has played an important part in the economy of the village, enabling the produce of local farms to be conveyed promptly to the London markets. A goods shed was erected for the protection of fruit and other delicate items. The purpose of this article is to stimulate thought and suggestions for when the situation envisaged in the first paragraph, comes about, and I should be very happy to hear of any proposals which Readers of ROSTRUM may care to put forward. SEPTEMBER PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) At the start of the meeting Mr Chris Wheal, a volunteer with the Service gave a presentation to the council. He said that fires in rural areas were different from urban ones. In rural areas the properties were often larger and older and therefore burned easier and inevitably it took the Fire Service longer to respond to a rural fire than an urban one. Time was important since a fire likes time, it doubles itself every 2 minutes.

For many rural fires more water than that carried by the Fire and Rescue vehicles was needed. So the location of fire hydrants was important, and also the ease of finding them as often they are covered by vegetation. The Service is looking for local volunteers who would be willing to inspect the village hydrants twice a year and report any problems. It was also important for additional sources of water to be known, ie swimming pools and lakes; after being checked by the KFRS these sources can be put on the KFRS database to help in times of emergencies.

Prevention was a priority and the KFRS were happy to give talks for village clubs and groups. They can also give demonstrations about dealing with chip pan fires, etc. Home Safety visits to give advice are free to those over 60, single parents and those with disabilities. There are special aids available for example for the hearing impaired vibrating alarms can be supplied.

Mr Wheal agreed to send the parish clerk copies of the locations of the village fire hydrants so that residents can be aware of the nearest ones to individual properties.

Drayhorse Meadow Councillors agreed to draw down a further £10,000 from the Public Works Loan Board to repair the track to the fields and to renew the fencing. They also voted to meet the cost of spraying against ragwort this autumn. A further spray will be required next spring to eradicate the plant as its presence is discouraging possible tenants. A site meeting with the T & M Tree Officer had taken place and she had advised on the types of trees to be planted and given details of a charity who would provide them with stakes free of charge. Councillors agreed to make a formal application for change of use on a small piece of the meadow for an overflow parking area.
