MAY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Mike Cayzer was elected Chairman for the next 12months.

The Chairman introduced our new County Councillor, Matthew Balfour, to the meeting. The Chairman reminded everyone of the Annual Parish Meeting on Tuesday 14th May at 7.30pm

Fencing off an area for car parking at Drayhorse Meadow and all new electrics in the stables had been completed. A quote of £345 for renovation work on The Stables at Drayhorse Meadow from Terry Smith was agreed

It was agreed the public would be asked, at the Annual Parish Meeting on 14th May, for their support on drawing down additional funds from the Public Works Loan Board. Repayment of any additional funds would not affect the Precept but come out of surplus.

Mike Witts reported that 10 people had helped at the work force weekend. Mike also showed the meeting a plan of the stalls for the fete on 2nd June.
Crime report April - vehicles parked in Glebe Meadow on pavement not allowing pedestrians to pass and some warning letters had been sent to drivers. a spate of vehicle crimes and investigations were continuing and a number of people had been spoken to. 3 young males were stopped from fishing in the Mill Lane pond and contact details were taken

Speedwatch - 158 recorded travelling at 35mph or above, which resulted in 16 warning letters sent by police for a second offence and 4 for a third. Six letters sent for driving at excessive speeds i.e. 45mph and above. Following an article in last months Rostrum one new volunteer had come forward. Charles Stroud was asked to investigate the cost of upgrading the Speedwatch equipment

Cllr Talbot told the meeting of a Kent Community Rail Partnership guided walk on 11th May. Future events include a historic train ride along the line from Strood to Paddock Wood and a music train.

It was reported that water was coming from a manhole cover at Maidstone Autos and this had continued for about 2 week and there were complaints on the smell emanating from the water.

WATERINGBURY PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, 7th MAY 2013

2012/13 Has been one of much activity for the Parish Council, which continues to operate with 3 vacancies. It would be nice if there was some enthusiasm from village residents especially, the younger ones, to take part in the running of the village.

During 2012 the Parish Council with the help of the Sports & Recreational Association, obtained Queen Elizabeth 11 status for the playing fields. The celebration of this takes place on the 2nd June next, when the Mayor of Tonbridge & Malling will unveil the plaque. Susan Cockburn our clerk & Mike Witts of the Fields Association have put an awful amount of work into making the whole event an enjoyable day for all the village.

During September last, Susan and myself had a feeling that something was about to happen at Drayhorse Meadow, this was discussed at the October Parish meeting, where it was agreed that we hold a public meeting to obtain approval from residents to apply for a Public Works loan, We set a limit of £200,000. This was approved by an overwhelming majority by those present at the public meeting held in the school. We then had an emergency Parish Council meeting, where it was agreed to proceed with obtaining the loan approval

We received approval on the 7th November, that afternoon I, Susan and Richard Long solicitor met with Mrs. Medhurst, we agreed a deal at £165,000, so long as all travellers had vacated the land, and purchase was completed on 7th December, We did not realize the state the site was left in, and a lot of work has been carried out to get to a condition where we can lease the area, and the income will be used against the loan repayments. We have fenced some of the field to be retained for parking, reducing congestion in Fields Lane & Pheonix, we will have to do some surfacing which will satisfy the authorities.

My thanks go to my fellow Councillors for their support, and special thanks to our Clerk Susan who keeps me in order, and for all the extra help, with Drayhorse, and the 2nd June.

"Doing" or "Being"

I have quite a busy Saturday ahead of me, including writing sermons, a wedding and meetings but the day began with Holy Communion that I conducted at West Malling Abbey for the Sisters. Before the Sisters start their daily routine they begin with Holy Communion and before each service they simply sit for 5 minutes in the peace and quiet of their chapel. It was a perfect start for me on an otherwise very busy day. The Sisters are a contemplative community and their ministry of prayer is enhanced by simply being there. Their presence is a great constant in the lives of many people who visit the Abbey seeking spiritual support and direction. They are always going to be there for people and many take great comfort from knowing that.

I was thinking this through this morning before the service began. Are we simply there sufficiently for one another or are we busy doing things all of the time. There is always a tension between "doing" and "being", between rushing round doing things and simply being there for people, our family and friends especially. A good friend of mine was a priest and a Headteacher of a London Comprehensive School, he was retiring and was to take a parish in inner London. I asked what his plans were for his new role and he said "I am simply going to be there". I was surprised by his response but he went to the parish and was there for the people. He gave of himself by "being" rather than "doing". That community loved his "being" for that was meeting their needs. After only a couple of years he died rather unexpectedly but he was so loved and his "being" brought people closer, particularly closer to God. Rather like the Sisters of West Malling, he was the constant in people's lives.

Interestingly, as a grandparent, I note that when my grandchildren come to visit they simply want to do nothing other than be with us. Children tend to be so busy "doing" that they seem hardly ever able to sit still and simply do nothing. They often see Grandparents as a constant in their lives. They just love to be around doing nothing with their grandparents who are simply "being".

Jesus provided the model for us to emulate. He certainly didn't rush round "doing" all of the time, he prayed constantly and saw that his presence, his "being", was often so much more important for his followers. Just look at the story of Mary and Martha, whilst Martha was "doing" Mary sat with Jesus who was simply "being". Jesus told Martha that Mary had chosen the right way!

As Summer approaches (we hope) why don't you chose the right way and leave a few gaps in your schedule occasionally and do nothing? Instead of "doing" why not try "being"? You may find it rewarding.
